

4 saboteurs executed, 3 jailed, Havana says

Four Miami-based Cuban exiles who slipped back into their own country on an anti-Castro mission have been executed by a firing squad, Havana Radio said yesterday.

Three others were sentenced to 20 years imprisonment, said the broadcast monitored here.

One of those executed was Amancio Mosqueda, known as Commandant Yarey and widely known in Miami's exile colony as a revolutionary.

The Cuban radio said the infiltrators had large quantities of explosives, arms, ammunition and equipment to sabotage railroads, sugar mills, cane plantations, industrial installations, highways and power lines in the Guantanamo area of eastern Cuba.

A revolutionary tribunal tried the men in Santiago, eastern Cuba, the broadcast added.

Three others were killed in a battle after the party land-

ed near Guantanamo on May 3, it reported.

Executed with Yarey were Angel Luis Castillo Cabrera, Francisco Cid Crespon and Manuel Rodriguez Pineda. Sentenced to prison were Yarey's brother Sixto Mosqueda Fernandez, Carlos Ramon Ibarra, and Tito Lopez Gomez.

The Miami-based anti-Castro organization, RECE, reported last July that Yarey and some companions had been captured in Cuba.
