

'Captive' Talks:

Island Regime Story Revealed

KEY WEST (AP)—Havana Radio today quoted a man identified as a captured saboteur acting under orders of the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency as saying the United States plans to occupy a large island off Cuba and set up a provisional government.

The captive, Miguel Angel Orozco Crespo, told authorities the U.S. would recognize it as the rightful government of Cuba and use the island—Cayo Romano off the northern coast of Camaguey Province—as a base for an invasion of the Cuban mainland.

Orozco Crespon also was quoted as saying that President Luis Somoza of Nicaragua planned to allow Cuban exiles, operating from Miami, to stage a fake attack on Nicaragua.

The radio said the plan was to brand this attack as an invasion from Cuba and use it as an excuse to appeal to the Organization of American states to call for an armed strike against the Fidel Castro regime from the United States.

The radio described Orozco Crespo as the CIA's chief agent in Cuba. He was identified as a former lieutenant in the army of ousted Dictator Fulgencio Batista and a native of Cuba's Las Villas Province.

In the capture of Orozco Crespo, Cuban security officials said they smashed an attempt to sabotage the copper mines of Matahambre.

Havana Radio said two groups of saboteurs landed near Matahambre, on Cuba's western tip, with a half ton of weapons.

Other raiders were identified by the radio as Conrado Caballera, Angel Fernandez, Luis Sierra, Orlando Garcia, Reinaldo Garcia Martinez, Nestor Izquierdo, Felix Sosa, Rduolfo Fernandez, Juan Tamayo and Orlando Arasol.
