It is much to be regretted that the gallant men who were wounded in Fla. should have been so unmercifully exposed to so much suffering and hardships; but by reference to the books of the A.C.G. office in the Deptt of S.C. & Fla. it will be seen that proper instructions were given over about the 7th of Dec last, to carry out your views;

The records of the Department referred to were, of course, left with my successor at Charleston.

Received at Charleston, with the eve of my
time of departure for this place, your letter of the 15th Inst,
Genl, enclosing a communication from Col. Long, Chief
of Ordnance, relating to the proper proportion of Light
Artillery in our Army, and asking my views on the
subject. Having paid lately special attention to
that arm of the service, I fully concur in the
opinion expressed by Col. L. that three guns per
thousand men, or five to six brigades of about

1500 men, are amply sufficient for an Army in the field; * but when ^{that army is} defending a position or guarding a defensive line, local circumstances, more than the number of men under arms, should determine the quantity and quality (calibres) of the Artillery required.

Of the number of pieces accepted as accompanying an Army in the field, only about one fourth or one fifth should be rifled guns; of which about four fifths should be 10 pdr Cannots, and the remaining one fifth, 20 pdr Cannots; the rest of the Artillery ~~of an Army~~ in the field should be light 12 pdr Napoleons, if practicable.

There should seldom be more than four pieces to a Battery, which should never contain more than two different calibres.

The guns and howitzers of a Battery must each be drawn by not less than six stout horses, for the distances passed over by our Armies are great, and the roads are generally bad; heavy 12 pdr Napoleons, 24 pdr Howitzers and 20 pdr Cannots should be drawn by eight horses to each piece.

The Light Artillery of an Army should be organized into Battalions of four Batteries (sixteen pieces) each, attached to the Divisions or corps of an Army. One fifth of the whole Artillery should be held in reserve under the charge of the chief of Artillery of the Army, who should be moreover, the Inspector ~~de facto~~ of all Light Batteries.

Thus, an Army of ~~sixty thousand men~~, Infantry and Cavalry, divided into forty brigades, (ten Divisions,) would contain two hundred pieces
* Rapidity of movement and accuracy of fire are the great requisites in battle.

of Artillery, of which one fifth (4 pieces) should be held in reserve.

These 200 pieces should be formed into 12 Battalions and 2 Batteries, containing in all 50 Batteries, of which 150 or 160 pieces should be 12 pounder Napoleon's, and 50 or 40 pieces should be rifled guns, of which $\frac{4}{5}$ should be 10 pound Parrots and the other $\frac{1}{5}$ should be 20 pound Parrots.

Such is the general organization I would adopt for an Army in the field, subject to slight modifications, according to circumstances.

Your favor of the 25th Oct: has been received. I regret I have not time to answer at length your inquiries - the movements of the Army up the Mississippi at Memphis and Paducah, require that I should visit Corinth at once to see to its defenses and to those of the R. & O. R. R.

I have not assumed command of the Army of Tennessee, although having authority to do so, for the reason that I have temporarily joined it at Gadsden. At it was already on its march to the Tennessee River, in view of Genl Scott's plan in which I did not wish to interfere, unless dictated by accident had been evident. Since the arrival of the Army many delays have ensued which are due to the want of the Commissaries & which I could not have avoided by assuming direct command, but I have made every effort to expedite matters as much as practicable.

I regret to find ourselves so close again to O-

united, that must put it out of all spots in the
Confederacy - I sincerely hope we may not be com-
pelled to winter there.

With regard to your enquiry about putting negroes in
our military service, I must say, that when at Centreville
I advocated the system of employing them as team-
sters and cooks and of forming also with them one
company (100 men) of recruits per Brigade. Afterward
I advocated adding one of said Co. to each Regt. of
White troops for the purpose of working on Roads, R.
Roads, fortifications, trenches &c. - Now that our sup-
ply of White men is so reduced, it decidedly appears
putting negroes in the ranks under competent officers
few negroes to be made non-commissioned officers
& slaves, who shall give faithfully during the War, to
be freed after Peace, & receive in a fair allowance of
public lands a bounty money to start with in life. I
have not yet had time to consult w^t the subject among
of the General officers here, except General Forest,
that hero of Burnside, who says that he would give a
great deal to have now under his command a few
Brigades of negroes properly officered and organised.

History tells us that "the Normans concentrated in their time of despair (283, ~~225~~ B.C.) all their strength, even the slaves armed in the common cause and victory now more attended the Standards of Romul. Hannibal retreated to save the town of Marat & the forces of the King of Macedonia, who had joined the Carthaginians, were also defeated at this juncture! What better example can we desire? We do not invite in him, the Normans, nor may they have slaves, horses & liberty.

I thank you for the confidence you say the people have in me, but impossibilities must not dispirit us from mortals!

My position is a most difficult one having a large number of country so defend with few troops, & those not all of the best quality, "as long as there is life there is hope in a righteous cause"

Now then, after so much talk I will admit that it is time to strike at home, we must settle the situation for the dead-
