

## ARRESTS AT NEW YORK.

The fact of the seizure at New York on Thursday last of the New Orleans steamer George Cromwell has already been announced. The Times says:

"The names of the parties arrested and the specific charges against them had been withheld by the Government authorities until Monday, when it was announced that among them were Hon. H. Segur, formerly Minister to the United States from the Government of San Salvador, and his wife and maid-servant. Also, Mr. G. F. Cauty, a merchant of this city, and Mr. D. Perez, of San Salvador. Mr. Segur and Mr. Perez were arrested on board the George Cromwell, where they had embarked for New Orleans. Mr. Cauty was not going out in the steamer, but was discovered to be intimate with the suspected parties; and was arrested as he was about bidding them adieu. On the person of Mrs. Segur was found a bill of lading for fifty kegs of lard, which had been shipped on board the British barque Circa-sian. On Friday the kegs of lard were seized, and in them were found one thousand navy revolvers. In the personal baggage of Mr. Segur and Mr. Perez were also found revolvers and rifle and pistol cartridges. In the bosom of Mrs. Segur and of her maid-servant were also found revolvers, and even the children belonging to the family had the same articles concealed about their clothing. The parties were all taken to Fort La Fayette on Sunday. Several other parties, including the firm in Cortlandt street at whose house the barrels containing powder were packed, which were seized on the George Cromwell, have also been arrested, but their names are withheld for the present.
