WHO IS BROWN, THE LEADER? (REIGN OF CAPTAIN JOHN BROWN, THE LEADER OF THE INSURRECTION.) He was accompanied by seven sons, the youngest being not old enough to earn his livelihood... The birthplace of Brown is not positively known to the writer, but reports are that it was in Kentucky. At the age of twelve he was sent to school at West Point, where he was a student of medicine, being, muscular, and possessing an iron constitution...
