ARTICLE 27. Duty of the smilitary. It shall be the duty of the commander in chief and all officers and soldiers of the army to afford special protection when needed to Congress or any member thereof, to the Specialent, Vice President, Tressurer, and Secretary of war, and all civil officers or other persons having the right to the same.
