

Provost Court.—*Judge Peabody.*—Jas. Brice, accused of bronching and embezzling cargo on board of a ship lying at Post 17, was tried and discharged, the testimony failing to implicate him.

Six females were arrested and sent to the Workhouse, three of them for drunkenness, and three for forming the seraglio of an amatory Turk from the green Isle of Erin.

Edgar Redatzki, for getting drunk and disturbing the peace of a coffeehouse, was required to pay a fine of \$5.

John Holly *alias* Smith, and one Bender, were up on a charge of having broken into a store in the Third District and stolen therefrom \$300 worth of dry goods. The goods were found in the possession of Bender and he was sent to prison for six months. But Holly, though presumed to be the principal offender, was discharged, the proof against him not being clear.

John Cook, a negro deserter, was up. He confessed that he had deserted four months ago. A fearful penalty awaits him. He was remanded.

Blanche, a fair and flashy lady of the night, was before the court for talking disrespectfully to a Son of the Silver Moon. She was required to pay a fine of \$10.

Ed. Gannon, who was accused of breaking and smashing trunks, &c., was discharged, he being about as much sinned against as sinning.

Ben Sanders, a slave, was up for tampering with the rest of his master's slaves, and for stealing \$20 from his master. The charge was not substantiated to the satisfaction of the court, and the case was dismissed.
