EDUARDO J. CHIBAS

Secretary of Public Works in the De Cespedes Cabinet Is Dead

uardo J. Chibas, ex-Secretary of Public Works and well-known engi-

neer, died shortly before last mid-night of a heart attack at his residence in Vedado, a suburb, at the age of 72. Born in Santiago de

Cuba, he was educated in Cuba and in the United States, being a grad-uate in engineering in 1889 from

Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. He served as aide to General Miles of the American Army at Santiago de Cuba during the Span-ish-American War. In 1933 Mr.

Chibas was appointed Secretary of Public Works in the Cabinet of President de Cespedes. Mr. Chibas leaves a widow and

two sons, Raul and Eduardo Jr., a student leader during the revolutionary period who now is a member of the House of Representatives.

Dr. Chibas, who was well-known in American engineering circles, was exiled for many years after his imprisonment for his alleged part in an attempt to overthrow the government of President Ger-ardo Machado. He came back to

the United States after his imprisonment in Cuba. In 1933 he returned to Havana to accept the post of Secretary of Public Works in the newly formed Cuban cabinet.

During the Spanish - American War he served with the United States Fifth Army Corps as an engineer and in later years con-tinued his engineering activities in Cuba. He was president of the Cuban Society of Engineers and a

life member of the American So-

ciety of Civil Engineers.
