

up this island's military forces for continental defense was voiced by United States Representative Andrew J. May, chairman of the House Military Affairs Committee, here today.

Mr. May, who arrived yesterday "for a brief rest and to look over the military fortifications" of the Havana area, has conferred with government officials. He divulged no details, however. Mr. May expects to return to the United States tomorrow.

Coincidentally, the Cuban Government has announced plans for a huge airfield with landing facilities for a thousand planes at San Antonio de los Baños, some twenty miles outside of Havana.

President Fulgencio Batista yesterday inspected the proposed field, which will cover 400 acres, and said construction work would begin immediately.

This field, according to Colonel Otaño Soca, chief of Cuban aviation, would be the general center for operations on the island, and auxiliary fields will be constructed in all the provinces.
