

# Suspect Dragnet On, Tanks Leave

Havana police continued yesterday a wide-spread roundup of suspects in Wednesday's surprise attack on the Palace by a group of rebels.

Meanwhile, everything was outwardly calm and normal and business continued operating as usual.

There was no official announcement on the number of persons picked up for questioning, but one reliable estimate placed it at 200, most of whom were released.

The four tanks which guarded approaches to the Palace Thursday were withdrawn Friday morning. A reinforced military guard continued on duty both inside and outside the Palace, including military intelligence cars at each of the four corners with men armed with sub-

machineguns. Traffic was detoured from the Palace main entrance street.

Over at the University of Havana, strong police detachments continued to hold it to prevent students or other rebels from entering for refuge. The university has been closed since last November.

Although no fresh details of military operations against Fidel Castro in the Sierra Maestra mountain range in Oriente province were given out yesterday, two high-ranking army officers from Oriente were in town to report to President Batista.
