The original APOC F EUR/X was influenced and doubtless orientated by communists, because the Cuban labor movement was under the complete con-LAB trol of communist labor leaders from the time of its founding until 1947. ljp

Despite the fact that the communists lost control of the labor movement in 1947, the communist APOC has continued to function and has apparently been successful in maintaining a whip hand over the majority of the labor publications because of their original communist orientation and through its control of advertising. It seems that the communist APOC has contacted most of the firms in Cuba who do extensive advertising and promised complete coverage in all labor publications and the elimination of bothersome individual solicitations, with the result that APOC collects the money for advertising and then distributes it among its members. Those magazines which follow the communist propaganda line and publish the Party's articles, reportedly get the "lion's share" of the advertisements. If a particular editor declines to publish Party propaganda, APOC simply refuses to pay him for any ads he may carry in the magazine. Thus, some magazines may be forced, if they wish to exist, to publish communist articles, against their own convictions.

The communist APOC claims to have a membership of forty-five labor publications. A partial list was included in the despatch under reference and the Embassy is attempting to obtain a complete list which will be forwarded to the Department upon receipt. At the most recent elections, December 1950, held by APOC, the following

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Non-Communist APUC

The official AFOC was set up shortly after the control of the labor movement was taken from the communists, for the purpose of taking over labor publications. However, according to one source of information 1/, it has been extremely ineffective, primarily because labor leaders have seen no particular political nor monetary gains to be made through its control and therefore have made no effort to improve it nor to fight the communist controlled AFUC.

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The Embassy will continue its investigation of the two organizations and as additional information becomes available it will be forwarded to the Department.

COMPENT

There appears to be little doubt that the communist APOC controls the majority of Cuba's labor publications - forty-five as compared to the official list of eighteen. Control outside the Mabana province is completely in the hands of the communists, since they maintain APOC offices in each of the Provincial capitals, while the official APOC only has an office in Habana.

In reply to the last paragraph of the airgram under reference, requesting an explanation as to why Cuban firms volunteered the information contained in Embassy Despatch 2431 of June 8, 1951, the following information is submitted:

As was reported by the Embassy in its despatch 385 of August 7, 1950, certain firms were approached at that time, on an informal basis, concerning their advertising in the Communist newspaper <u>Hoy</u>. Most of them indicated a desire to withhold all assistance from the Communists and withdrew their advertising. Many of the firms, however, stated they were often not aware as to which publications were controlled by Communists and which were not. Therefore, when the Embassy learned of the extent to which the Communist APOC controlled the labor press, those businessmen who had previously cooperated in the <u>Hoy</u> campaign were informally advised of the status of APOC. Subsequently, as was reported in the despatch under reference, several firms informed the Embassy that they had withdrawn their advertising from the Communist APOC.
