Ambassador's Call on President Urrutia on May 6.

On May 5 I told Minister of State Agramonte that I Would like to pay a courtesy call on President Urrutia. I stated that I particularly wished to thank President Urrutia for some friendly expressions regarding the United States and regarding me personally Which he had included in a television address last week. The interview was arranged for the following day at 6:00 p.m. Minister Agramonte was also Our conversation covered a variety of topics along more or less conventional lines. I was impressed by President Urrutia's cordiality and friendliness toward the United States and by his realization of the role that private enterprise must play if Cuba is to continue to develop economically and to move toward the objective of a higher standard of living for all Cubans. The President stated that it would be only in case Cuba fell back in the struggle for economic improvement that Communism Would find opportunities for control here. I endeavored, with what success, I do not know, to impress the President with some of the factors involved in economic development other than the providing of very large sums of money, and I also tried to indicate the relative slowness of over-all progress even in those countries Which have the most outstanding records in this respect.
