SUBJECT: CUBAN REVOLUTIONARY ACTIVITIES

On August 28, 1958 the writer investigated the vicinity of the residence located at 4160 Alton Road, Miami Beach with reference to alleged revolutionary activities taking place on the premises.

The residence is a one story C.B.S. house, pearl white color, with gray spanish shingle roof. There are two entrances, the main one is sheltered by a covered porch on which face two iron frame windows.

A secondary entrance is located near the middle of the North side of the house and it is covered by an aluminum hurricane awning painted white. There is possibly a third entrance in the back of the house.

On the North East side of the house the corner is rounded as to give a towerlike appearance.

A concrete driveway leads to the back of the house where a garage is located. A frame apartment has been added to the garage.

The writer observed three males of apparent Latin origin sitting on iron lawn furniture, who later on were joined by two females and two or three children. These persons sat on the lawn until about 9:30 PM when they retired into the house and apparently were intent in watching a T.V. program. Only a female of about thirty years was left sitting on the porch where the lawn furniture had been moved.

No other activity was observed in the residence. There were no cars parked on the premises.

The residence located to the North of the above mentioned house is used as campaign headquarters for candidate Commissioner Hoffman and there were five cars parked in front of the house.

There was a 1958 Plymouth sedan bearing '58 Florida 1E-1853 leased out from Hertz Co. in Chicago Ill. parked in the driveway of the house located to South of the 4160 residence.
