

Funeral of Colonel George H. Hall.

The last rites due a valiant soldier and esteemed citizen were yesterday afternoon paid the remains of Colonel George H. Hall, formerly of the Second regiment, Excelsior Brigade. The funeral took place from the late residence of deceased, No. 37 Livingston street, Brooklyn. The procession was a large and imposing one. The Second second regiment, National Guard, under command of Colonel Adams, acted as escort. There were also present nearly all the officers of the Ninety-third regiment, National Guard, of which deceased was a member. Delegations from other Brooklyn militia regiments took part in the proceedings. New York city was also represented, both in a military and civic sense. The Sixty-sixth, National Guard, was represented by Capt. John Bagley, Capt. Dempsey and others. Mr. F. L. A. Boole, the City Inspector, together with a large number of the assistants of his office, attended the funeral. These latter gentlemen wore white badges, upon which were inscribed the words "City Inspector's Department." In the piers where the remains of the lamented Colonel reposed were congregated a number of his personal friends. On the lid of the coffin was the following inscription:—"George H. Hall. Died May 14, 1864, aged 38 years, 10 months and 9 days." The coffin was of rosewood, elaborately mounted. Shortly after two o'clock the procession turned, and the remains of the worthy soldier were conducted to their last resting place.
