

HERE TO PURCHASE SUGAR MACHINERY

Trenton Woman's Husband Represents Syndicate Which Will Spend \$6,000,000 in Cuba

Under the caption of "Six Million Dollars Will Be Invested in Cuba," the following item, which will doubtless interest many readers of the Times, appeared in a recent issue of "La Discusion," a Havana newspaper:

"Yesterday, over the Central Railroad, (from Santiago de Cuba) there arrived in Havana, Enrique C. de Villaverde, Count de Villaverde, and his wife (daughter of Dr. William G. McCullough, of Trenton). Mr. de Villaverde is the son of the late Cuban novelist, Cirilo de Villaverde.

The trip of the Count de Villaverde according to our advice—is to acquire in Cuba lands to establish several central sugar plantations in various provinces of this Republic, as he represents a syndicate of North Americans which will invest in Cuba six millions of dollars in sugar mills.
