

COLONEL TITUS SHORT OF FUNDS—DECLINES
TO BE ARRESTED FOR HIS DEBT. *Chicago, Dec.*
18. An intelligent gentleman, residing in this
city, arrived here yesterday after some weeks
prospecting in Kansas. He left Kansas City
on the 8th inst., and came through to Jefferson
City by private conveyance. Titus was at
Kansas City with nine of his men, the rest had
gone on to St. Louis in small companies. My
informant witnessed an attempt of the sheriff
of Kansas City to serve a *capias* on Titus, is-
sued in a suit for an unpaid board bill which
he had incurred at Westport. Titus raved and
swore, glared his eyes, threw himself into de-
flant attitudes, said he and his men could burn
the whole town, damned its citizens as aboli-
tionists, and threatened death to the sheriff if
he attempted to arrest him. He said he was a
gentleman, and would not be called upon to
pay debts in such a public manner. The sher-
iff did not make the arrest. At Jefferson City
my informant saw several of his men, who were
waiting for him, utterly out of money.—*Cor.*
