

## Affairs in Kansas.

[Correspondence of the St. Louis Republican.]

WESTPORT, Nov. 25, 1856.

By a letter from Tecumseh, I learn that the Second Judicial District Court, Judge J. G. Cato, is still in session. Night before last, thirty one, out of forty seven prisoners who were undergoing trial for murder and other crimes, escaped from the dungeons of the Court House in that place; they picked out the brick, and if it had not been that one of them accidentally stumbled against a sentinel, all would have got away. There are but sixteen prisoners left. The Marshal has taken steps to re-arrest the fugitives, but, when they get among their free State friends, it will be very difficult to do it. It is quite gratifying to hear news of general peace and prosperity all over the Territory. Business between this part of the country and Kansas is lively; immigration is going on, and money getting plenty again.
