Reliable intelligence from Kansas to the 20th states that Lecompton has not been attacked yet by Lane's party, although hourly expected.

It is said the Abolitionists number two thou sand strong in the Territory, and that they are preparing to fortify Lawrence in case that retreat to any particular point may be necessary.

Immediately after the attack on Col Titus' house, in which shirmish Titus was wounded, and one man killed and mineteen taken prisoners. Shannon went to the camp of the Abolitionists and exchanged the prisoners taken at Franklin for those taken at Titus' house.
