

**NEWS FROM KANSAS.**

St. Louis, Aug 25.

Reliable intelligence from Kansas to the 20th states that Leecompton has not been attacked yet by Lane's party, although hourly expected.

It is said the Abolitionists number two thousand strong in the Territory, and that they are preparing to fortify Lawrence in case that retreat to any particular point may be necessary.

Immediately after the attack on Col Titus' house, in which skirmish Titus was wounded, and one man killed and nineteen taken prisoners, Shannon went to the camp of the Abolitionists and exchanged the prisoners taken at Franklin for those taken at Titus' house.

It is reported that four companies of United States troops are near Leecompton, whose presence

it is thought will deter further attacks by Lane's party

The Republican of this morning publishes a call signed by a large number of the most influential citizens of this city, for a public meeting to be held at four o'clock to-morrow, to take into consideration the present situation of affairs in Kansas, and to express the opinions of the people of St. Louis in connection therewith

The steamer David Tatum, from Missouri river yesterday, brings information that 400 volunteers from Jackson county, Missouri, went into Kansas Thursday last, that two hundred have been raised in Lafayette county, and that a large force was being raised in Clay county. Lane's regiment is said to be fortifying on the Wapakusa. Robinson, Brown and the other prisoners are still in the custody of the United States troops. One hundred and twenty recruits from Cahale Barracks arrived here yesterday and were immediately forwarded to fort Leavenworth, also seventy from Jefferson Barracks, Gen. Smith having made a requisition for all disposable force. Orders have been issued to the commanding officer at Fort Riley to have his troops in position
