

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

LATER FROM KANSAS.

CHICAGO, Dec. 4.—Kansas advices state that Gov. Geary had taken measures for the recapture of the prisoners recently escaped from Lecompton. The grand jury having found true bills against several pro-slavery men, a public meeting had been held—Surveyor-General Calhoun presiding—at which Gov. Geary and his inquisitorial courts were repudiated and denounced, and a call issued for the law and order men to meet at Leavenworth on the 1st of December.

Col. Titus has given notice to all persons wishing to go to Nicaragua to render services, to assemble at St. Louis on the 10th December, and a free passage is offered. He says that after the settlement of the Central American question, it is his purpose to turn his attention to Cuba.

CONGRESSIONAL.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—The Senate resumed the consideration of the motion to print an extra number of the President's message and accompanying documents. An animated debate took place, in which Mr. Wade was particularly severe on the President. Without concluding, the Senate adjourned over to Monday.

In the House, the Whitfield case was up, and by his friends making motions intended to postpone action, an early adjournment took place.

LATER FROM HAVANA.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—The steamer Cabawba arrived here to-night in three days and twenty-two hours from Havana, being the shortest time yet made.

The rumored re-appointment of Gen. Concha as Captain General is not confirmed. It is believed that efforts to introduce African apprentices will prove unsuccessful.

MUNICIPAL ELECTION AT SPRINGFIELD.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Dec. 2.—The City Election in Springfield, yesterday, resulted in the re-election of the present Democratic Mayor and City Clerk over the Fremont candidates. To the Board of Aldermen five Democrats and three Republicans are elected, and to the Common Council six Democrats eleven Republicans and one American.

SCHOONER FROM RICHMOND ASHORE.

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—The schooner New York, of and from Richmond with a light cargo of Flour and Tobacco is ashore at Squam Inlet. The crew were saved.
