

The Southern Kansas Crusade.

The Southern papers are, since the evidence of the election of Mr. Buchanan, urging with hot zeal for a final and crushing crusade into Kansas, with the object of bringing the population of that Territory at once up to the mark for a State, and bringing it headlong into the Union as a Slave State. The New Orleans Delta is especially rampant. It having been suggested that Gen. Walker had offered Col. Titus, of Kansas, strong inducements to "emigrate" to Nicaragua, the Delta says:

No Southern man can be spared from Kansas. Governor Geary deserves praise for the vigor he has displayed in coping with the Abolition hordes, but he has not yet proved that he is a General Walker. Such a man as the latter with a stern iron will and an invincible faith in the future of Southern institutions is wanted in Kansas. We cannot entertain the notion that our victory in Nicaragua is to be won at the expense of our cause in Kansas. The day for mean, faithless expediency doctrine has passed away; our rights and the determination to maintain them, no matter whether in or out of the Union, must be our watch-word; and when the hubbub attending the Presidential election shall have passed away the cause of the South in Kansas, must be advocated with more earnestness than ever.

Gen. Whitfield is in Louisiana preaching Kansas. The Delta says of him:

He has done good work. He has "become a name." Louisiana scarcely understood the Kansas necessity, or at least, she did not act understandingly; now the battle is won—and to such men as General Whitfield and the nameless but gallant rank and file of the Missourians who aided him and his, let the victory and the laurel crown be given.
