

ALLEGED PLOT REVEALED FOR A CUBAN REVOLT

AIRED THROUGH LETTER WRIT-
TEN BY SENATOR DELGADO.

Juan Parra, Investigator, Is In Dis-
favor Through Island Owing
To Past Conduct.

HAVANA, July 27.—The tale of an alleged plot for a Cuban revolt is aired to-day in the newspapers through a letter written by Senator Morna Delgado, a participant in last year's revolution.

Delgado asserts Juan Maso Parra, recently returned to Cuba, is planning to work Cubans up to an attempt to drive out the Americans. He exposes the plot so no one will be deceived, and as the speediest way of bringing about Cuba's independence again is to have no further disorders, which would only make American occupation indefinite.

Parra denies the conspiracy through another journal. His standing among Cubans is not the best because of his alleged treachery during the war against Spain. In 1895 he was prominent among the revolutionists, but turned against his countrymen, formed a battallon for the Spanish cause and fought for Spain. Upon the Spanish defeat he was compelled to flee. He tried to return during General Wood's administration, but his landing was so bitterly resented that he re-embarked. He finally came back a few weeks ago and has made himself conspicuous by openly declaring Cubans can drive out the Americans.
