

FIGHT AT JUAREZ, MADERO ENDS IT, 5 DIE ON OUR SOIL

**Small Party of Rebels Get Into
City, but Leader Holds His
Army in Check.**

BULLETS FATAL IN EL PASO

**Our Troops Protest and Keep
Back People—Government Will
Not Intervene Yet.**

BIG RIGHT TO-DAY PREDICTED

**Rebel Leaders Said to be Deter-
mined—Madero, However, Be-
lieves in Diaz's Patriotism.**

VERA CRUZ NOW THREATENED

**Revolt Quickly Rises in Jalisco and
Guadalajara Is in Danger—Rains
Trouble the Railroads.**

Juarez was attacked yesterday by about 150 Mexican rebels, including many Americans, who disobeyed Gen. Madero's orders against fighting on the American frontier. Gen. Madero had great trouble in preventing the main body of his army from joining in the attack, but finally prevailed with his reluctant commanders and men. The small band of rebels penetrated well into Juarez and defeated the Federal forces, but, having no support, are reported to have retired late in the evening.

Five persons were killed on the American side of the line, and many were injured by bullets that fell thickly in El Paso. Troops kept Americans back from the line so far as possible.

The Administration at Washington regards the killings at El Paso as incidents of war and intervention is no nearer.

Negotiations for a renewal of the armistice and the peace parleys are going on at Juarez. Gen. Madero places faith in the promise of Gen. Diaz to resign when peace is restored, but opposite opinions are held by some rebel leaders. There are even rumors that an attack on Juarez will be made to-day.

In Mexico City Gen. Diaz's manifesto is not regarded as peaceful and it is not thought to meet the demands of the rebels. It is counted as hopeful, however, in that it shows that Gen. Diaz has begun to realize the gravity of his situation and the necessity of addressing the people. The War Department has been ordered to press hostilities with greater vigor. If sufficient do not volunteer for the army the draft will be put into effect.

In the States near the capital the situation steadily grows worse. Guadalajara, in Jalisco, and Vera Cruz City, heretofore untroubled, are now threatened by rebels. In Zacatecas and Puebla the insurrectos continue to gain. Floods due to Spring rains are carrying away temporary railroad bridges and cutting the lines.
