

Additional from Nicaragua.

The San Francisco Herald gives the following extracts from a letter received by Mr. Edmund Randolph, of that city, from Colonel Lockridge, dated Aspiwall, May 15th. The account of recent events at Rivas given by him, coincide to some extent with the Costa Rican versions, and is probably correct in the main. Col. Lockridge says:

"I have late news by a native courier from Rivas. Col. Walker still holds out, and says he can maintain his position for three months longer. He hopes that you and his friends will send him aid at once, ammunition, men, etc. He wants to carry the war into Costa Rica, but is too weak to make a successful move until reinforced. I go to New Orleans by his direction. I was forced to leave the San Juan, from dissatisfaction among my men, brought on by English interference, etc. "The General has had three great battles since you have had any news from him, in all of which he drove them back with great slaughter. The last one was on the 25th of April, in which he took a 24, 18, and 12 pounder from them, and killed near 500 of the enemy, and took 250 prisoners, with a trifling loss on his side. He had allowed them to occupy many of the outer buildings in Rivas, and all at once blew them up, and at the same time charged them. This has alarmed them so they cannot be made to attack him again; and as they lost all their heavy cannon, they have made no further attempt against him. His force is near 500 Americans, and the natives are joining him every day. I do hope you can do something to aid us in California, and do so as quick as possible. I have letters before me from Mr. Soala, Col. Slatter, Kewen and Rawles, of ordnance department, and they implore the General to hold out a little longer, and they will send him a thousand men to invade Costa Rica, on the Atlantic side. This will be done at once. There is no confidence to be placed in anything you hear from this place, as they are our enemies.
