

ALLEGED C.I.A. MEN TALK ON HAVANA TV

HAVANA, Nov. 2 (UPI)—Four alleged Cuban agents of the United States Central Intelligence Agency, said by Premier Fidel Castro to have been captured when they landed last month, appeared on a Havana television program tonight and testified they had carried out several clandestine missions for the C.I.A. since 1960.

Dr. Clemente Inclan, a yachtsman in pre-Castro Cuba, said he began delivering arms to Cuba for the exiled Christian Democrats movement before he was recruited by the C.I.A. He said the C.I.A. organized all arms shipments but that no Americans participated in the deliveries.

At a C.I.A. training school in

Miami, he said, he met his fellow prisoners here—Alberto del Busto, Alberto Miranda and Luis Montero Carrazana.

Dr. Inclan said he was captured when he landed from a launch off the mother-ship Rex. He was allegedly captured the same night Cuban warplanes shot up the Liberian flag freighter J. Louis.

Montero Carranzana, the other speaker among the four men, said he once landed 12 infiltrators on the north coast of Matanzas Province from a yacht that had a crew of American C.I.A. agents.

Premier Castro, in a TV-radio talk Wednesday night, charged that the Rex, a 174-foot ship of Nicaraguan registry, based on West Palm Beach, Fla., was used by the C.I.A. for operations against his regime. The Rex's owner, a Miami businessman, denied this.
