

The Cincinnati Fugitive Slave Case.

Yesterday morning the Sheriff made a return on the writ of Habeas Corpus, that the slaves were in the custody of the U. S. Marshal, and, therefore, without his jurisdiction. This returned the slaves to the custody of the Marshal. By an agreement with all, the parties permitted the slaves to remain in the county jail all day yesterday, with the understanding their examination should commence this morning.

We learn that the mother of the dead child acknowledges she killed it, and that her determination was to have killed all the children, and then destroyed herself, rather than return to slavery. She, and the others, complain of cruel treatment on the part of their master, and allege that as the cause of their attempt to escape.

The Coroner's Jury, after examining the citizens present at the time of the arrest, went to the Jail last evening and examined the grandmother of the child—one of the slaves. She testified that the mother, when she saw they would be captured, caught a butcher knife and ran to the children, saying she would kill them rather than to have them return to slavery, and cut the throat of the child, calling on the grandmother to help her kill them. The grandmother said she would not do it, and hid under a bed.

The Jury gave a verdict as follows:—That said child was killed by its mother, Margaret Garner, with a butcher knife, with which she cut its throat.

Two of the jurors also find that the two men arrested as fugitives were accessories to the murder.

It is expected the examination of the fugitives will commence this morning before Commissioner Pendery.
