

**A SPEECH OF A ROW.**—It appears that the length to which Henry Ward Beecher has gone recently in his advocacy of negroism and amalgamation has excited the just indignation of many of the most respectable citizens of Brooklyn. We heard a lady who resides there, of much respectability, say after the Beecher performance of having, on Sunday, a mulatto girl and her bastard child, that he ought, as a punishment for his abuse of decency, to be made, if it were possible, to marry the yellow girl whom he seems to regard with such tender solicitude. On Sunday evening last it was rumored that a number of citizens, who felt justly indignant at the course Beecher had pursued, were determined that the Sabbath should not again be disgraced by such an indecent performance. The "nigger worshippers" were very much alarmed, and got up all sorts of horrible stories about a riot, &c. They called upon the police, who were compelled, much against their will, to protect the people who meet to sing and pray over the supposed wrongs of negroes, but who have very little sympathy for the interests of white men. The church was surrounded by a large concourse of people, who behaved very creditably. The people of Brooklyn seem determined not to allow the slander to go forth to the world that they are amalgamationists, and are ready to "marry and be given in marriage" to negroes and mulattoes.—*N.
