Sir:

I had the honor to telegraph to the Department on the 2^d instant, reporting the capture of the American brig "Mary Lowell," at New York, by the Spanish war steamer "Andaluz" or "Andalucia" at Ragged Island (one of the Bahamas).

The brig at the time she was ordered to lower her sails was three quarters

quarters

quarters of a mile south
of the South-East point
of Little Ragged Island,
in British waters with
an English Revenue
Officer and Pilot on
board and she was
engaged in shifting
her berth from the
man of war to the inner
anchorage for greater
safety in the event of
bad weather.

this unjustifiable
seizure, brought to
Havana by H. G. M.
ship "Oribe," are con-

I have the honor to accompany

"Mary Lowell" of New York, at Ragged
Island by the Spanish gunboat "Andalusia",
the news of which has been brought here
by the British war steamer "Cherub".

The substance of all appears to be, that
the brig "Mary Lowell" was at Ragged Island
and had been watched for a number of

days by the Spanish war Steamer "Andalusia" or "Andaluz", that the Master of the brig had left her and returned to New York for instructions, leaving the vessel in charge of Mr. Thomas Wilson, Custom House officer at that port.

That on the 15th ^{when} Mr. Wilson in his double capacity of pilot and custom house officer was moving the brig from the men-of-war anchorage to the inner harbor, the Commander of the Spanish gunboat with few preliminaries took possession of the brig and soon afterwards sailed in a South westerly direction, having her in tow.

It also appears that one of the Peruvian Monitors made its appearance at the front at about the time of the capture of the brig.

I send you the above information for your guidance, you being where you can communicate to the Government by telegraph ad libitum.

It appears, however, to be a matter that interests the British Government more.

particularly than our own.

I was informed today that the Spanish Government here has information that a filibuster expedition of four hundred men, of which three hundred are Americans, is either about to sail or has sailed from the United States for this Island; my informant (the Political Secretary) states that preparations had been made to capture the expedition in Spanish waters - that the whole of them would probably be shot. He states also that they are sold; to use his own words, "vienen vendidos como Cristo"; leaving the inference that they are betrayed - sold by one of their own number.

I would respectfully suggest that you would communicate the above to our Government - its charge of Secrecy was enjoined - but I think our Government should be informed confidentially, and if possible prevent the departure of any such expedition, which is almost sure to end disastrously.

I called to see Mr. Dunlap this A.M. who submitted all his despatches for my perusal and kindly allowed such as were desired to be copied for your information and for transmittal to the Hon Secretary of State.

State, Mr. Hall's letter will however inform you of his action in the matter.

Deeming the matter of sufficient importance I telegraphed it to you and Mr. Hall having at the same time sent a message to the Honorable Secretary of State at Washington.

The Commander of the "Cherub" informed me that the "Andaluza" would probably take her prize to Matanzas. You will also perceive by the Tassan Herald Extra, enclosed to you by

Mr. Hall, that one of
the Peruvian Monitor,
lately at Key West,
is now at Ragged -
Island having run
into and sank the
steamer covering her, the
whereabouts of the other
Monitor is not given.

While at Key West
I was informed by
the Commander of the
Peruvian that after
leaving there, his first
stopping place would
be at Crooked Island
for coal.

I have the honor to acknowledge your letter of the 27th ultimo, with a copy of a despatch (No. 7) from the U.S. Consul General at Havana, dated the 20th ultimo, transmitting a copy of a decree of General Dulce, whereby, among other things, are established certain discriminating export duties in the island of Cuba, to take effect on the first of the present month - subject however to the approval of the Home Government of Spain.

This new legislation seems to pursue the same spirit of hostility to American shipping
Hon. Hamilton Fish. Secretary of State.

Shipping that has for so many years characterized the Spanish policy; but which this Department had been led to hope was about to be abandoned. It was understood that Spain but awaited the exhibition of a corresponding spirit on the part of the United States to open commerce with entire freedom to our shipping, relieved of all unfriendly exactions.

It was partially in that expectation that this department recommended, and Congress passed the late law of March 1, 1839, removing to a very large extent the retaliatory burdens and restrictions heretofore imposed by us on Spanish vessels from Cuba and Porto Rico, and elsewhere; and it was in the

Same expectation and belief that this Department
would credit its letter byon of the 26th
ultimo. If these views and expec-
tations have been (mistaken it is of
the highest importance that this Department
should understand it, and it would on
that account seem proper that this new
burden should not escape notice.

Sr,

In Obedience to the Department's telegram of the 24th of March, directing me to investigate the capture of the American Brig "Mary Lowell", in British Waters, I have the honor to inform it, that the case is now in the hands of the English authorities. Consequently, I called upon their Consul General here, a few days since. He stated that he had taken the matter in hand, for his Government, & had received a reply to the demand for the return of the vessel, from the Captain-General, who stated that the case was now in the Spanish Admiralty Court, and as soon as its decision was known, he would inform him.

The enclosed list of the names of American Citizens - some with their families - was handed yesterday to the Captain-General, with the request that they might have a safe conduct to Cuevitas through the Spanish lines, being at present in the interior, in the neighborhood of Principe.

He promptly complied with the request, by

issuing the necessary orders, the same day.

The want of vessels, I regret to say, prevents me from sending to bring these people to Havana, in order that they may get the means of transportation to the United States, the Narvaganset being at Key West, and the requirements of American citizens making it necessary for me to remain at Havana, for the present, but I hope to relieve them, at an early day, if they can find their way to the coast, through the lines of both Cubans and Spaniards.

One of our Consuls, at a small town on the Northern Coast (Cibao) a Mr. Codrington was released by the Government at the joint request of our Vice Consul-General and myself, although suspected of conspiring against the Spaniards.

In connection with this subject, I would respectfully recommend that some public expression be made by our Government, in reference to the dangerous principle of the arrest of Foreign citizens, on suspicion, which I perceive is being carried out in this Island, by those in power, & increasing, daily. Such a course, I feel satisfied, will, in some measure, check them.

Sir:

Yesterday I found in the public prison of Remedios and among a class of people not of very good character or antecedents, two young persons, one called Santiago A. A. amiable about 20 to 23 years of age, and the other, Ramon V. Rivas, who does not appear to be more than 10 years old, and it gave me great pain to see them abandoned and mixing with such unfortunate companions and much more so because I consider that those two persons were duly despatched from Havana for a Foreign Port and that they arrived here on their way to New Orleans on board the American Schooner "Lizzie Major," whereof Giles is master; and which arrived here on the 13 day of March, loaded and left on the 26 of said month for New Orleans and that the same day she was boarded by boat of the Spanish Frigate of her Catholic Majesty called the Fernando Catolico on the high seas

about 10 leagues distant from the Coast of this Island, and they were brought to this port and placed in the prison of Remedios where they still remain under the only pretext as I understand that their names were not placed on the manifest of the ship. Granting that this was so, the fault is not of the passengers, for they have nothing to do with the papers of the ship which was dispatched by the Consigners according to custom, and if that requisite was indispensable it should have been exacted while the ship was in the Spanish Waters and not in neutral waters as it appears it has happened. Consequently they alone are responsible to the Country under whose flag they sailed, and for this reason I hope these gentlemen may be placed at liberty without delay - proper documents given them to continue their journey and such expenses as they ^{may} have incurred be paid to them.

Havana, Feb. 26th 1869

My dear Sir,

I arrived safely here the day before yesterday. Under the circumstances prevalent in Cuba it occurred to me that it would be proper to call upon the Capitan General of the Island, General Dulce & to explain to him the object of our cruise, that we might not appear suspicious if in the course of our investigation it became desirable to dredge in the immediate vicinity of the Islands. I therefore called upon Admiral Hoff & requested him to introduce me to the Capitan General which he very cordially consented to do. By appointment we called this morning at the Palace & were very graciously received. After giving to General Dulce an account of what had already been done by the Coast Survey to explore the Deep Sea Fauna on the American side of the Gulf Stream and expressing my wish of connecting these results with the Islands of Cuba, he at once offered every assistance in power & went so far as to say that if the cooperation of his vessels, officers, pilots & instruments was needed, it should readily be tendered & that orders would be sent to all the Commanders of the coast to inform them of the object of our cruise. It seems to me that under the circumstances this is a manifestation of unusual courtesy. I intend & I take the liberty of suggesting that you request the Secretary of State to acknowledge the courtesy in warm terms. How that nations take their standing by the degree of culture they manifest, I feel that no opportunity should be lost to express our appreciation of such acts.

The undersigned on behalf
of the New York & Mexican S. S. Line beg to call your attention
to the following.

This Line dispatch their steamers to Vera Cruz & Sisal
every twenty days from this port - calling at Havana going
out & returning & sail from New York on Schedule Time.

The cargo hence is nearly all for Mexico - most of the
trips sailing none for Havana.

The Spanish Consul here exacts from us a Manifest
to be certified by him of the above mentioned cargoes for
Mexican ports, this document must contain the full
particulars of every package, viz - weights, values, consignees
etc.; which is of very ~~serious~~ inconvenience ~~loss~~ - as on
acc't of this requirement, the steamers are obliged to
cease receiving goods earlier than if that ^{whole} formality
was not needed by him; we say useless, because we have
positive information from the Custom House Authorities
at Havana that this certified document is not required
there, We are able to give without inconvenience a
Manifest of the goods laden here for Havana & only
ask that the steamers of the New York & Mexican Mail

it shall be allowed to clear at the Spanish Consul here without giving any manifest of the cargo intended for the Mexican ports, being only bound to Havana in transit for those ports.

We have no doubt, but that the ~~Spanish~~ Minister will give the Consulate here the necessary instructions to further our desire by laying before him the facts.

We beg to mention that the Customs Authorities at Havana only require from the ship, a manifest of the cargo on board, en transit without all the details as required by the Spanish Consul here - & that document is made on board by the Person of the ship on his way to Havana.

The steamer referred to in the foregoing carry the U. S. mails for Havana & Mexico -

My Sister Mrs del Risco
now or lately residing in the
vicinity of Puerto Principe
in the Island of Cuba with
her husband and four
children were when heard
from in March last desirous
of returning to this City but
were fearfull to attempt it
lest they might be massacred
on their way to the seaport
of Havilas were they hoped
to take refuge ^{and passage} on board a
National vessel to Havana
or if possible to some southern
port of the United States
there being no Merchant-
vessel sailing to or from
the port of Havilas.

In March last my father addressed a note to the Hon W H Seward and received a letter from his secretary saying I believe that measures would be taken to get to my sister and family a passport to bring them through the lines of the Spanish army which extended five or six miles out from the port of Newitas.

We were informed that the authorities at Havana had sent orders that they should safely be conducted so that they might be embarked on board a vessel of war if one was there to receive them.

I wish to know if a vessel has been directed to remain here to receive and protect those Americans wishing to embark.

From all that we can learn no dispatch has ever reached them and as the Spanish troops have since then penetrated to the city of "Principe" it is probable that there has been some negligence on part of the authorities to send the promised passport. Can no communication be had by our government with our relatives and countrymen in the interior and a safe escort be given them to the sea port of Newitas and a war ship be ready to take them on board on their arrival.

It seems that the authorities are powerless to protect our countrymen and relatives from the attacks of the Spanish volunteers. Can they have protection

In obedience to your order of the 8th inst. directing me to "proceed to the City of New Orleans to communicate with the authorities, civil and military for the purpose of obtaining all possible information in regard to the supposed fitting out of Cuban expeditions in that vicinity".

Upon diligent inquiry it appears that the four first named gentlemen neither know, nor have they any grounds for believing that such expeditions are proposed in the vicinity of New Orleans; Mr. Gray,

Collector, has specific instructions from Washington on this subject and has recently exercised great vigilance to arrest all infractions of the Neutrality Law.

Senor Charles Pie, the Spanish Consul has no information of a reliable character, but states that some weeks since there were movements on foot, believed to have in view the formation of an expedition against Cuba, but that it failed for want of means; that some negotiations had been commenced for the purchase of a steamer, but that they had failed as money could not be raised to complete the purchase, and the steamer had found other employment. At this time he has no other, or more definite information than flying rumors which cannot be traced to any authentic source.

From the conversation held with these gentlemen for the purpose of gaining information on this subject I am unable to discover that there is even a probability of any such expedition being seriously

contemplated, although its organization
has doubtless been discussed and
perhaps proposed.

Sir

We beg to bring to your notice the following fact, which appears to us, worthy of your attention.

Upon the 16th day of May 1868, the American Schooner "Alfred Keen," Capt. David Robinson, arrived at Matanzas Cuba from Aspinwall, in ballast without cargo. Capt. Robinson produced and delivered to the Custom House Officials a manifest written in Spanish also one written in English stating that the vessel was in ballast having no cargo on board - There being no Spanish Consul at Aspinwall, a circular certificate to the manifest could not be obtained, the Spanish Authorities claimed that inasmuch as there was no consul at Aspinwall to certify

his manifest, the Captain should have them certified by three resident Merchants of Aspinwall; in default of which a fine of one hundred dollars in gold was imposed upon the Vessel.

Capt Robinson placed the amount of the fine in the hands of his Consignee who gave bonds to pay the money over to the Customs officials, if, upon reconsideration they decided not to remit the fine.

This fine has not been remitted and as the Vessel Consignee cannot have this fine cancelled without paying the fine the whole thing remains as at first.

This same Vessel has before this gone upon the same Voyage to Aspinwall then to other ports in Cuba, and many other Vessels have the same, but never to our knowledge has the fine been imposed for lack of a manifest certified by Merchants of Aspinwall. We respectfully beg that you will instruct the Council at Matanzas to make inquiry into this matter, and if possible have this fine remitted.
