Dear Sir

A question has arisen between the American Consul at Trinidad, Mr. Fox Esq, and myself respecting the fees of the American Consular Agency that I hold here.

Without any solicitation on my part, the Agency was unexpectedly offered to me by Mr. Fox and I accepted it, he stated that my salary would be \$5. per month and that he hoped soon to forward to me my official appointment, which I duly received from the Department of State at Washington, previous to my receipt of the "appointment" it was shown to the Captain General of the Island of Cuba who approved of it and caused his approval to be published in the official Gazette of Havana; I have reason to believe that these formalities were not adopted in the case of any one of my predecessors, who simply received their appointments from the Consul at Trinidad.

I hold therefore that my appointment is an exceptional one, and as such, I am entitled to all of the fees of this Consular Agency in accordance with Section 4, page 449 of the Consular instructions; it is not that I need the fees but I claim them on principle.

Mr Fox informed me that he would supply me with blanks re but that the Department does not allow, Salary

Salary of Secretary nor office rent! now I have a Secretary or Clerk if you will, to whom I pay \$34. & mo. for it cannot be supposed that if I write an official note to the Governor or to the Commandant of the Port that I am going to deliver it myself!

The office rent amounts to the moderate sum of \$10 per m. When I took charge of the Consular Agency, on the 12th June last, I found that the books were inadequate to the service, so I sent to the U. States for books ruled in the proper form, & also sent for blanks that are neatly printed; the books I now have could not be obtained here at any price as there is no workmen here capable of making them. My desire is to place the Consulate here on a proper footing.

The "Institute Seamen's Fund" I do not look on as simply applicable to sailors but applying also to destitute Americans but these I assist from the fees of this Consulate. I enclose a copy of a dispatch from H. H. Underhill, 2nd assistant Secretary of State, to Mr. Fox on the subject of the fees, I presume that Mr. Underhill is not acquainted with the special facts of my appointment.

I also enclose a note of the Consular Income and expenses here. If you will represent the facts in the proper quarter you will much oblige

Sir,

In a note received this day, from Geo. G. Baker Esq. Disbursing Clerk in the Department of State, accompanying the remittance to pay the last bill rendered by Allan Pinkerton for services in filibustering matters, he states, "The Secretary desires that these expenses be very much reduced. He also desires you to report as to the necessity of any further expense of the kind"

I have the honor to reply - that in accordance with your request, I have reduced the force from one Superintendent and eight detectives, to one superintendent and three detectives.

There is no doubt that the Cuban junta and their sympathizers in this City, being aware of the strict watch kept over their movements, have been deterred from fitting out expeditions.

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I respectfully request that, from this date, the force I have named (one Superintendent and three detectives) should be retained for the present, to continue our surveillance over the movements of the Junta.

Small bands of straggling Cubans, said to be awaiting transportation to Cuba, are scattered all over the City, and rumors are rife that they are endeavoring to get off an expedition at an early day.

Nothing but a desire for the strict enforcement of the Neutrality Laws, induces me to recommend the employment of detectives.

Enterado del convenio celebrado en 25 de Junio último, entre el Honorable Mr. Hamilton Fish, Secretario de Estado de la República de los Estados Unidos, y el Sr. José Morales Lemus, Ministro Plenipotenciario, Encargado de Estandarero y Encargado de Negocios de la República de Cuba en Washington, con el objeto de concluir las paces que esta República sostiene con España, por el cual el Sr. José Morales Lemus se comprometió en nombre de Cuba a aceptar la mediación interpuesta por el Gobierno de los Estados Unidos, basada en las siguientes proposiciones:

- Primero: Que España ha de reconocer la Independencia de Cuba.
Segundo: Que Cuba pagará a España, en el plazo y en la forma que por ambas se acordare, una suma como compensación del abandono completo y definitivo por parte de España de todos sus derechos sobre esa Isla, incluyendo las propiedades públicas de toda especie. En el caso de no poder Cuba pagar toda la suma de una vez en efectivo, se aceptará el pago de los plazos al producto de las Aduanas por derechos de importación y exportación, haciendo ambas partes un convenio sobre el modo de percibirlos, y respondiendo así al pago del principal y sus intereses hasta el finiquito de las deudas.
Tercero: Que la esclavitud quedará abolida en la Isla de Cuba.
Cuarto: Que se celebrará un armisticio durante las negociaciones para llevar a cabo el convenio de que se ha hecho mención.

Aprobado en todas sus partes aquel convenio y autorizado expresamente al Sr. José Morales Lemus por lo que usa con toda libertad

de los plenos poderes que le están conferidos p^{er} llevar
esas negociaciones hasta su completo término en todas
sus incidencias y dependencias.

may have for its basis the
recognition of Cuba as an inde-

on any basis, so that it may
redound to the welfare and
honor of the Republic which
he represents.

In like manner
I declare that any convention
or treaty that may be made
between both Republics, on
the basis aforesaid, and which
may be signed by the Citizen
Jose Morales Lemus, as Minister
Plenipotentiary of Cuba, may,
if it be deemed proper, be put
into execution even before re-
ceiving the ratification of this
Government. — Havana, Oct. 26, 1869.

Carlos Manuel Cispedes, Presi-
dent of the Republic of
Cuba;

Having been ap-
prised of the convention con-
cluded, on the 25th day of June
last, between the Honorable
Hamilton Fish, Secretary
of State of the Republic of the
United States, and the Citizen Jose
Morales Lemus, Minister Plen-
ipotentiary, Envoy Extraordi-
nary, and Charge d' Affaires
of the Republic of Cuba at
Washington, with the object
of putting an end to the war
which this Republic is sustaining
against Spain, whereby the
Citizen Jose Morales Lemus

engaged, in the name of Cuba, to accept the mediation proposed by the Government of the United States, based on the following propositions:

First, That Spain is to recognize the independence of Cuba.

Second, That Cuba shall pay to Spain, in such time and manner as may be agreed upon by both parties, a certain sum, as a compensation for the entire and final relinquishment of all her rights to that island, including public property of every kind. In case of Cuba's inability to pay the entire...

sum at once, in cash, the im-
port and export duties of the cus-
tom-houses shall be appropri-
ated to its payment, by instal-
ments, both parties agreeing as
to the manner of collecting
said duties, and the payment
of principal and interest, until
the final liquidation of the debt,
being thus provided for.

Third, That slavery is
to be abolished in the island.

Fourth, That an ar-
mistice shall be declared
during the negotiations for
the conclusion of the convention
aforesaid,

I approve this
convention, in all its parts,

and I specially authorize the
Citizen José Morales Lemus, to
exercise, with all latitude, the full
powers which have been con-
ferred upon him, to carry
out said negotiation, in every
particular.

Consulate General of the United States

On this the twenty-fourth day of December
A. D. Eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, before
me the undersigned, Vice Consul General
of the United States of America at Havana
personally appeared Mr Joseph Bucknam
master of the Bark "Arthur Kinsman" of
Portland Maine who being by me first duly
sworn deposes and states as follows:

That on the 27th day of October last past
he sailed in and with the said vessel
from the port of St Johns N. B. bound
to Cardenas for orders.

That on the day previous to his departure
from said port of St Johns, he applied
to the Spanish Consular Officer at that
port for the usual clearance papers
- and for which he paid fees amounting
to \$13.⁴⁰ - say thirteen dollars and forty cents
of which ten dollars were for the
authentication or legalization of two manifests
of his cargo, two dollars and forty cents were
for a bill of health, and the balance, one

dollar, for some other fee of which he has at present no recollection. —

That he reached Stone Key Anchorage, port of destination, on the sixteenth day of November last past, and on the following day proceeded to Cardenas with the vessels papers consisting, among others, of a bill of health; an authenticated manifest, his own written manifest, known as a "sobordo," and a sealed letter from the Spanish Consular officer containing, as he supposes, another authenticated manifest all of which were duly delivered to the proper office of Customs, at that port.

That on the 17th day of November last past his consignees at Cardenas, instructed him to proceed with his vessel to this port, and duly cleared him therefor from that Custom House. That on the 22nd day of the same month he sailed from Cardenas, having been furnished with a sealed letter from that Custom House for the same office at this port, which

was duly delivered to the boarding officer on arrival, on the following day, to wit the 23^d November last past.

That his vessel being loaded and ready for sea, he yesterday applied for his clearance at the Custom House of this port, and although he has received the usual sealed package, the Administrator has refused to concede to him the port pass to enable him to leave the harbor, alleging an infraction, on his part, of the 7th Rule of the Royal order of July 1st 1859.

And this appears further declares that he is not aware of having violated any Rule or Regulation to be observed by masters of vessels visiting this Island and that any omission that may have occurred in reference to the alleged infraction of the Rule referred to, should be attributed to the Custom House authorities of Cardenas, or whosoever else may be

responsible therefor, and not to this appears
and he doth solemnly and respectfully
protest as I the said Vice Consul General
at his special instance and request
do also protest against ~~any~~ continued
responsibility of himself or vessel for
such omission, farther declaring that
his detention at this port is of great
prejudice both to himself, to the owners
of the vessel, and to the shippers or owners
of the cargo, in whose name he doth
also protest against all authorities persons
or persons responsible and liable for
his detention, and for all damages and
expenses incurred or that may hereafter be
incurred in consequence thereof.

In testimony whereof, this appears has
hereunto subscribed his name, and
I the said Vice Consul General have
granted him this public instrument,
under my hand and the seal of this
Consulate General, to serve and avail him
and all others concerned as need and occasion
may require.

Dear Sir,

In my last of 25th I wrote you I was detained on account of an unjust claim made by the Officials of Customs, which Mr. Moll & Mr. Hall, our agent advised me not to pay.

Mr. Hall protested on 26th against the detention of the vessel and claiming damage. He has given

the subject his closest attention, has had two interviews with the Captain General and two or three with the Intendants of Customs, to my knowledge, and up to noon this day we have been denied our Clearance.

They have received my Duplicate Manifest delivered at Cardenas 16th Nov. by to days mail, which proves to them that they are in the wrong.

I transmit a copy of protest for future use if required.

I think this infamous outrage should be reported to the Government.

I shall sail in the morning, and hope we shall get a good run out, after so much delay.

Sir,

The Revenue Cutter "Bronx", by direction of the Secretary of the Treasury, has been, for a length of time, under my control, to aid me in enforcing the Neutrality Laws. But in consequence of late instructions from yourself, the necessity for her being retained under my orders, apparently no longer exists; and I therefore think that she could now be allowed to resume her ordinary Revenue Duties.

I feel much indebted to Capt Constable and his Officers, for the prompt and faithful manner in which my instructions have always been carried out.

As it was by your application to the Treasury Department that the "Bronx" was placed under my orders, I will be pleased if you notify that Department that her services are no longer required.

revocation of the fine must be a
matter of record in Cuba

Dr. Sir:

In the early part of last year the Brig "Omaha" of this port, of which vessel we are agents and part owners, was unjustly fined for a simple clerical error in Manifest of cargo from this port at Manzanillo, Cuba: the error consisted of an omission, not giving the weight of cargo in kilogrammes. The vessel refusing to submit to the fine was detained nearly two months, during which time we were in correspondence with the Secretary of State at Washington, and our Vice-Consul General at Havana, and finally on the advice of the Secretary of State, Mr. Seward, we paid the fine, some \$2263. in gold, under protest, and the vessel was released. Early in September we received notice, through the charterers of this vessel, that the fine had been revoked, and a fine of Twenty five (\$25) dollars imposed in its stead, and the fol-

lowing is a translation of a copy
of the notice of revocation.

Copied Translation.

Office of the Collector of the Port.

The Collector of Customs (Central depart-
ment) under date of the 20th inst., has
been pleased to communicate to me the
following:

"His Excellency the Superior Civil
Governor, in use and by virtue of the
faculties to him conferred, has revoked
the fine imposed to the Captain of
the Brig "Omaha", and imposed in
its stead the fine of \$25. according
to rule 7th of the Royal Decree of
1st July 1859, which I communicate
to you for your government, by order
of His Excellency."

of which I inform you for your
satisfaction, and in order that you
may take the necessary steps to pro-
cure the return of the fine by ap-
plication to this office.

In reply to your letter under date of
January 27, making inquiries relative to the number
of detectives employed by me, I have the honor to reply:
That on the 12th of November last, I addressed you as
follows:

" November 12th 1869 "

" Hon. Hamilton Fish,

" Secretary of State ;

" Sir :

" Mess^{rs} Webster and Craig of
this City, Counsel to the Spanish Government, have or-
dered the withdrawal of all detectives employed by them "

" The force of two or three detectives now employed
by me, is wholly inadequate to keep me advised of the move-
ments of the Bullbustlers."

" Shall I employ an additional number of
detectives, as circumstances seem to require? "

" I have the honor &c "

To the above I received the following reply from
the State Department:

" Department of State

- Washington Nov. 15. 1869 "

" S. R. Harlow Esq.

U. S. Marshal New York "

" Sir "

" Your letter of the 12th instant relative to
the discharge of the detectives lately employed by
Messrs Webster and Craig, is received. "

" In answer to your inquiry as to whether
you could be allowed an additional number to those
already under your orders, I have to state that the
request is granted, and you are instructed to report

to this Department from time to time as to the number and the necessity for retaining them."

"I am, Sir,"

I then wrote to your Department as follows, under date of November 20:

"November 20th 1869"

"Hon. Hamilton Fish
Secretary of State"

"Sir:"

"According to instructions contained in your letter, under date of Nov. 15, I have the honor to report—"

"That I have now engaged one Superintendent and eight detectives. Two men are kept employed in watching the movements of Steamers in this Harbor: Two men are in the confidence of the Junta; One man to keep in with the parties who fitted out the Hornet;

as it is likely that if any other vessel be fitted out, these same parties will have control of her; two men to keep track of straggling Cubans throughout the City, and watch their boarding houses and haunts, and gather general information; one man to watch the shipment of arms and ammunition."

"Although as I understand the matter, we cannot stop the shipment of arms and ammunition, except they are accompanied by men; yet it is possible that, in this manner, we may obtain a clue to an expedition."

"This force will be increased or decreased, as circumstances may seem to require."

"I am, Sir, &c."

"S. R. Harlow"

During the time that these detectives were employed, I had daily interviews with the Superintendent, Mr. Davies, and he furnished me daily with

detailed written reports of his subordinates' operations, and of the movements of the filibusters, and of their ~~sympathy~~ ^{sympathy} ~~of~~ ^{of} this or that. I frequently asked him if it were possible to employ a less number of men, and at the same time keep well advised of filibustering movements, and his answers were uniformly in the negative, which answers my own judgment fully corroborated.

Just as soon as I thought that the detectives could safely be discontinued, and their services dispensed with, I made up my mind to do so, of which fact I had the honor to inform you, personally, in Washington,

When startling rumors came to the knowledge of the Superintendent, an additional number of men was employed; but the average number of eight was not exceeded.

Trusting that my explanations will be satisfactory,
