Sir

I have the honor to inform you that an American steamer (the "Hornet") flying the American flag, and bearing American papers all in due form, has been for several months closely watched and menaced by Spanish Men of War in this harbor. And at the present time Spanish boats, filled with arms and men, hover around her nightly in an insolent manner; the lives of the American officers and men are freely threatened; and it is openly declared by the Spanish officers that having wasted so much time already in watching her, they will, on the absurd charge that she is a pirate, soon assume the responsibility of firing upon her in these neutral waters, leaving the three powers Spain, Haïti, and the United States to adjust the affair by diplomacy, afterwards.

The aspect of the case seems so serious that I venture to invite your attention to it, and ask you to touch at this point, if you find it well to do so, at as early a date as convenient.

Sir,

I have just received, via the Navy Department and New York, from Commander C. C. Carpenter, commanding the Nautilus and the Senior Naval Officer in the vicinity of San Domingo, a report, dated July 18<sup>th</sup>. 1871, in which he enclosed a copy of a communication from Mr. Bassett, our minister resident at Hayti, dated June 14<sup>th</sup> 1871, calling for the presence of a man-of-war at Port au Prince to protect the Hornet, an American Steamer with papers all in due form, from threatened Spanish violence. Mr. Bassett states that the Hornet has been for several months closely watched and harassed by Spanish man-of-war in this harbor, and at the present time (June 14<sup>th</sup>) Spanish boats filled with arms and men hover around her nightly, in an insolent manner; the lives of the American officers and crew are freely threatened and it is openly declared by the Spanish officer that having wasted so much time already in watching her they will on the above charge that she is a pirate and assume the responsibility of firing upon her in these neutral waters, leaving the three powers, Spain, Hayti and the United States to adjust the affair by diplomatic afterwards.

Commander

Commander Carpenter reports that he wait the original  
from Mr. Bassett to the Navy Department. I did not  
think he says it advisable to act upon it myself as the  
case of the "Hornet" is well known and the "Tennessee" with  
this vessel were there only a few months ago:

In my No 10 of January 17<sup>th</sup>, written to you from Port-au-Prince,  
I reported to you that the Spanish Consul General there, when  
he called on me then said that if he had a Spanish man-  
-of-war here (there) he would capture her (the "Hornet"),  
that I answered that Spain had no right to capture  
her in a neutral port, or on the high seas except within a  
Marine League of Spanish land; to which he assented and  
said his interpreter had misinterpreted him. As the case  
of the "Hornet" though exceptional involves important principles,  
and has been referred to the Department by the said  
Officer in that vicinity, I ask that appropriate instructions  
may be given to me on the subject and that the Depart-  
-ment notify me by telegraph on the receipt of this despatch  
if it intends taking any action affecting my movements.



Sir:

I have written you a number of times concerning a sum of \$8500 gold imposed upon the Am. Dry Dock & the South at Cienfuegos Cuba, which was informed by you last winter, that an order to refund the money had been sent to the Collector at Cienfuegos from the proper Authority at Havana. Mr. Dethorne Acting  
Counsel at Cienfuegos says the order is there, but that the money will never be paid until our government sends a man-of-war and makes a demand for it.

Now I would like to know what kind of a government we have got, that will let a sixth rate power like Spain, murder our citizens, rob our vessels and acknowledge they have done so, and laugh at the exertions we make to try to get our money back. I am one among many thousands, who to day are ashamed to own that they are Americans.

In April last the Ship "Princentown" was libelled, condemned and ordered to be sold by the United States District Court, and was so sold by the United States Marshall, free from all claims. I bought the ship loaded her for Liverpool, but when I went to clear her was refused a clearance until I paid \$64 claimed by the Custom House Authority for over time of an officer while discharging her cargo, previous to her being libelled and sold. After having been detained two days, I paid it under protest and now appeal to you for whether it is not the amount of money that I care about, but the principle on which the present government works.

My father was a old line whig and I have always been a republican, but not a politician. I never voted but twice in my life, and that was for General the last time and for Grant. Now I can afford to lose the above \$64 and cost of protest, and I can also spend \$64,000 on the next presidential election.

See Note to Spainkin 21 Sept 1871

Subject: Fine of \$500 on the  
"Queen of the South".

The fine was imposed in Dec<sup>r</sup>. 1869  
at Manzanillo, Cuba, for want of  
a third manifest, under a Spanish  
regulation.

Much correspondence, at the  
instance J. B. Winchester, the owner,  
has taken place between the Dept.  
and Consulate General, until on  
Jan<sup>r</sup>. 31. 1871 Mr. Biddle encloses  
a copy of a letter dated Jan<sup>r</sup>. 27. 71  
from the Intendente of the Treasury  
stating that on that date an order  
had been issued to the Central  
Bureau of Payments "to grant a  
remittance of \$500. in favor of  
Messrs. Llanuza & Co. for the amount  
of the fine imposed at Manzanillo  
upon the master of the Amer. brig  
"Queen of the South".

This was immediately communicated  
to Winchester. He sends the same to  
the

his Agent at Manzanillo (Mr. Acton, the U. S. Consular Agt.), who on applying for the money was informed on July 22<sup>nd</sup> 1871, (by letter) that no order of the King had been received by the Administrator of Customs there. The Vice Consul Guile's comment on this is, that the fine having been imposed and exacted before appeal could be had to the Central Authorities, and divided among the officials (now probably out of office) the Treasury is without an appropriation to pay what it has ordered to be restored.

This is the present condition of the case in this Dept.

Mr. Wincheski now writes that the order for refunding is at Manzanillo but will not be acted on without a show of force by the United States.
