Sir,

I have the honor to answer  
your official note of the 12<sup>th</sup> instant.  
The American Steamer "Virginia"  
of New York, Captain F. E. Shepperd,  
arrived from La Guayra at this  
port on the evening of the 24<sup>th</sup> of October  
ult<sup>o</sup> and the next morning, the 25<sup>th</sup>,  
the Captain called at my office with  
her register, articles, and crew list,  
which, after examination I found  
in perfect order. The Captain refer-  
red to me that he had sailed from

New York for Curacao, and from the latter port he had cleared for La Guayra.

On the 4<sup>th</sup> of November, she cleared from this port for the Island of Trinidad, via La Guayra.

On the 20<sup>th</sup> of the same month, she arrived at this port from La Guayra, the Captain calling the same day at my office, with her papers in perfect order.

On the 22<sup>nd</sup> of said November, she cleared at my office for Curacao and the sea.

On the 9<sup>th</sup> of this month, she arrived direct from Curacao, cleared by our Consul at that port, and her papers in order were deposited with me, the vessel lying still at this port.

On the 11<sup>th</sup> of November, Captain Sheppard resigned his command will-

-ingly and presented as his successor,  
with the consent of the Agent of  
the vessel, Henry Marquez, a citizen  
of the U. S., who is since that date  
the master in command of the  
"Virginia".

Sir:

Many years ago my husband Mr. James West made a claim against the Spanish Government in order to indemnify himself for the damages which he had sustained on account of his being restrained of his personal liberty, and also for the embargo which, without any just excuse was laid on his property in the village of Sagua la Grande.

My husband died on the 29 of July 1861 and my father in law Mr. E. West continued the prosecution of the claim until his advanced years prevented him from undertaking any important business, and I therefore am under the necessity for my own and my children's sake to carry on this affair.

In order to economize your time I will give you a succinct account of this business, according to the documents which are in my possession.

Mr. James Howe West was a Native of the

of the Spanish Government in 1850, and  
of the Spanish Ministry of Finance, that the  
Spanish Cabinet is of course responsible for the  
State of Rhode Island, in December 1850, he went  
to the Island of Cuba for commercial purposes,  
on the 20<sup>th</sup> of January 1850 he was arrested at Sagua  
la Grande by the military authorities, on suspicion of  
political designs against the government, his property  
was there seized, but after a trial before a military court  
he was fully acquitted.

Mr. West through his father begged the government  
of this republic to demand of the Spanish Government  
indemnifications for the damages which he had sustained.

The Secretary of State the Hon. Mr. Clayton, addressed  
April 1<sup>st</sup> 1850 a letter to the ambassador in Spain, in  
order that he should make the claim. He did so,  
and his Catholic Majesty's Secretary of State, in a long  
letter dated the 4<sup>th</sup> of May 1850, stated that his  
Majesty knew nothing of this affair.

After another letter from the Hon. Mr. West, father of  
Mr. James West in January 1852, addressed the General  
Assembly of the State of Rhode Island asking that  
the Senators in Congress from that State be  
instructed to enquire into the facts of this case,  
and to adopt all constitutional means to  
secure relief to one of his fellow citizens, the  
oppressed without delay, and in violation of all

of the Board of Commissioners for the Affairs of the West, in a letter dated the 10th of August 1795, in which he is informed by the subordinate officials of a foreign Government

The General Assembly February 3<sup>d</sup> resolved that the Senators and Representatives in Congress from that State be requested to use all means within their control which may tend to procure the release of said West, and the restoration of his property with a suitable and proper indemnity to him for any injury which he may have received.

This resolution was addressed to Senator Charles J. James, who placed it in the hands of the Secretary of State, the Hon. Daniel Webster and the latter addressed him the letter that with date of the 20<sup>th</sup> of March he had received from the Minister of Spain in this Republic, His Excellency Sr. Calderon de la Barca, accompanied with a report from Sr. Manuel Estang de Ley, his Catholic Majesty's Secretary of State, in explanation of the proceedings instituted by the Spaniards authorities against Mr. James H. West.

Claims were therefore made in the Department of State, as verified by the letters of the Secretary of State dated the 21<sup>st</sup> of May 1800, 2<sup>th</sup> of November and 13<sup>th</sup> December 1795, and addressed to Mr. John West in which acknowledgements is made of the receipt of his letters, and offers are also made of attention to this

business of less some Mr James West.

The Secretary of State in his letter of the 20<sup>th</sup> of March 1860. assured him that an agreement for the adjustment of claims between the United States and Spain had been signed in Madrid on the 5<sup>th</sup> of said month, of March, and was then before the Senate for its consideration with a view to its ratification.

The Attorney of Mr West in a letter dated in Washington the 15<sup>th</sup> of April 1869, says that the Senate had papered the claim to the Committee on Foreign Affairs, and a Member of this Committee, had informed him that the claims had papered onto the hands of a subcommittee of three, who had thoroughly investigated the claims and pronounced it a just one and that they were ready to make their report as soon as the Commissioners appointed by the Government of the United States and those appointed by Spain, should fix a day for their meeting in Washington in order to adjust all claims between the two Governments.

Nothing having as yet been done I beg of you to have the goodness to inform me of the State of this matter, in order that I may make use of the rights which belong to

my children and myself

Gentlemen

I here with enclose you a Bill  
I have made out against the Spanish Government  
for the illegal seizure and detentions of my vessel in  
the Port of Cardenas in Mch. 1870. I wish you as ships  
husband to present the same or have it presented to the  
proper authorities at Washington. The facts of the case  
plainly set forth in the Protest a copy of which I  
enclose also a copy (in Spanish) of the release of my  
vessel at the time. On August last the Capt. General  
of Cuba sent a note to the Consulate at Havana  
saying that the fine was rescinded and all proceedings  
with drawn against my vessel. Mr. Edward A Sanchez  
of Matanzas who has attended to this matter for me  
from the beginning, writes he is in receipt of a note  
from the Intendente at Havana saying the Government  
at Madrid had authorized him to say to the Capt. and  
owners of the Brig Harry Kinder of Philadelphia  
that the Spanish Government would respond to a suit  
in the Courts of Havana for claims of said Brig —  
and asks what steps he shall take in the matter. I

Consider it a Proper Matter for the two Governments  
to settle and for further information refer to the  
Consul General at Havana (Mr. Biddle) who is Cognizant  
of the whole matter

By this Public Instrument of declaration and Protest  
be it made known and manifest unto all to whom  
these presents shall come or may concern, that on  
the day of the date hereof, before me the undersigned  
Consul General of the United States of America  
at Havana, Island of Cuba, personally appeared  
Mr. Walter Collins, Master of the American Brig  
"Harry Birdsn" of Philadelphia, now lying in the  
Port of Cardenas, of said Island who being by me  
first duly sworn, did voluntarily and solemnly  
declare and state as follows: that is to say, that  
from about the fourteenth day of October to the  
twelfth day of November last past, the said vessel  
lay at the mouth of Pierreville Creek, Saint Lawrence  
river, receiving a cargo of sugar Box shooks destined  
for said port of Cardenas. - That the place at which  
the cargo was loaded is situated one hundred  
and fifty miles from Quebec, at which port, foreign  
vessels loading in the Saint Lawrence river, are  
required to clear. That, it being late in the  
Season and to avoid detention from ice or  
otherwise, before completing the loading of the  
vessel, he proceeded to Quebec to obtain a clearance

He declares that on arrival at Quebec he ascertained that the Spanish Consul had removed his Office to Montreal, to which City he sent his papers for consular legalization. - That the Consular Manifest known as 'Sobordo' sent to the said Officer called for Five thousand Sugar Box hooks, which was the number, approximately, that this appearer supposed his vessel would carry, knowing that he had a right to rectify any difference that there might be, between his legalized manifest or 'Sobordo' and the true quantity that might be received on board, in his final note of cargo, known as 'Manifesto' which is the document to which faith is given at the Custom Houses of this Island, and also knowing that for any discrepancy between his 'Sobordo' and 'Manifesto' he would incur no other legal penalty than a fine of Twenty five Dollars, which this appearer considered of much less importance, than a longer detention of said vessel at that Port for the purpose of ascertaining the exact quantity received on board.

And this appearer further declares that in the prosecution of his voyage from Quebec to Cardenas he proceeded to sea and arrived at the last named

Port on the 30<sup>th</sup> day of November last past and on being boarded he delivered to the Officers of Customs the usual documents, amongst which was his own manifest or note of cargo, known as "Manifesto" which latter document he had prepared and ready for delivery several days previous to his arrival.

And this appearer further declares, that the Collector of Customs at the Port of Cardenas, did demand and collect of this appearer the penalty of "Five hundred and sixty eight Dollars and six cents, alleging that said appearer had made himself responsible and liable for double duties on the goods that were omitted in the 'Bobordo' but were included in the final manifest of cargo which this appearer duly and timely presented, against which penalty this appearer entered his protest at the Office of the United States Consular Agent at that Port, under date of January tenth 1870. -

And the appearer further declares that in pursuance of his Charter party, he sailed in and with said vessel from the Port of Cardenas for New York, on the twelfth day of February last past, and thence again returned to

Cardenas in ballast, on or about the thirteenth day of March last past, and after having received on board a portion of his return cargo the Custom House of that port, has demanded on the 26<sup>th</sup> day of March last, another penalty of Two thousand seven hundred dollars and upwards, being the value of the number of Shooks omitted in his Consular Manifest or "Libordo," but which as before stated were duly and timely included, in his final note of cargo or "Manifesto" all having reference to his aforesaid previous voyage, and placed the vessel under seizure until the question is settled.

And this appears further declares that the fine of Five hundred and sixty eight dollars and six cents, which was exacted of him in February last, is illegal, in that by the regulations of Custom Houses for this Island promulgated by Royal Decree, dated July first 1859, this appears can only be said to have violated the fifth paragraph of the first section of said decree which reads as follows: "Fifth, The bales, hogsheads, barrels, cases and other packages with their respective numbers and

marks, specifying in ciphers and writing, the quantity of each class, while the seventh section of said Royal decree provides the penalty for said violation in the following words, - to wit: "Seventh, And should it not contain the details mentioned in Rule First, they shall incur a penalty of Twenty five Dollars" - He further declares that the aforesaid Royal decree has been extensively published in foreign Ports, and has been represented by Spanish Consular Offices here, as the only regulations which foreign Ship-masters should observe, and the only penalties to be incurred.

And this appraiser further declares that there are many precedents for the foregoing statements and there has been many instances wherein discrepancies have occurred between the "Cobordis" and the manifests or notes of cargo of masters of vessels, and that the penalty incurred in such cases, has been the legal fine of Twenty five Dollars, and that in the case of this appraiser it is attempted to make him an exception to former precedents established, by similar cases at Cardenas and other ports of the Island.

Wherefore the said appraiser, in behalf of

himself, of the Owners and Charterers of said vessel  
and of all others concerned, has protested, and  
I, the said Council General at his special instance  
and request, do also protest against the acts of  
the Custom House Authorities of Cardenas, and  
against all and every other authority and  
authorities concerned in the exaction of the fine  
of Five hundred and sixty eight Dollars and  
six cents, against the subsequent fine of Two  
thousand seven hundred Dollars and upwards  
which is again demanded of the said appears  
against the seizure of the said vessel, and of all  
other acts whereby this appears and others con-  
cerned have been injured, as are herein before  
related - charging that the said fines are illegal  
in that, they are imposed in contravention of  
the aforesaid Royal decree, published for the  
guidance of shipmasters, charging also, that it  
is unreasonable in that there is no evidence  
whatever of any intention on the part of this  
appears to defraud the revenues of this Island  
he having in good faith, stated his full cargo  
in the manifest or note of cargo, known as  
"Manifesto," which he presented when first  
visited by the Boarding Officers of Customs at

Cardenas and claiming damages for each and every days detention of said vessel at the rate of sixty Dollars per day, and remuneration for all losses, costs, charges, and expenses incurred or that may hereafter be incurred, in consequence thereof. -

This done and protested in the City of Havana the first day of April A.D. one thousand eight hundred and seventy - In witness whereof this appearer has herunto subscribed his name and I the said Consul General have granted him this public instrument, under my hand and the seal of this Consulate General to serve him and all others concerned as need and occasion may require.

The voyage previous this vessel was fined illegally the sum of \$568<sup>00</sup> Gold, which I paid under protest in February 1870, being for the said alleged offense and for which a fine of \$2730<sup>00</sup> Gold, was subsequently imposed. This last sum I refused to pay I having been advised that the fine was illegal, and it was finally decided to be so

On the arrival of the Brig in the Port of New York about the 28th June 1870, and having delivered there the cargo taken on board at Cardenas, payment of freight on same, amounting to the sum of \$5600<sup>00</sup> was refused by the Charterers on the ground that in consequence of the seizure of the vessel and detention of her cargo a damage of over \$4500 Gold was incurred by said charterers, and in consequence of such refusal to pay, the parties in interest of the vessel have been obliged to commence suit against said charterers for the recovery of said earned freight, which case is still in litigation, not having, as yet, been reached for trial
