

ginia. He is 23 years old - about six feet high - slim built - front
teeth defective & fobugged - on arm (I think the left) stiff in the elbow -
eyes brown - hair brown - hands and feet small.

Sir,

My Son Henry H. Harrison who was with the Cuban insurgents was on the 25 day of May last (1871) in the Carcel (City Jail) of Havana in Custody of the Government under the following Circumstances.

Wishing to accept the terms of pardon offered by Government to those who surrender themselves, he presented himself on the 23 of January at the Terminus Palena Solo near Palencia in the jurisdiction of Cienfuegos.

It was believed by the Cubans that all Americans who presented themselves would be shot - so he was advised to report himself as an English Subject and to assume the name of "Enrique Santa Cruz Lopez".

He was promised a pardon, and permission to leave for New York - was not treated as a prisoner - was sent to the Hospital at Cienfuegos - left it April 28 - brought to Havana a prisoner the 15 May, and is now in the Carcel (City Jail). Other Surrendered under the same circumstances have been released, and he thinks that his detention arises solely from having been overlooked and forgotten.

Having complied with the terms of pardon offered ^{by} the Captain General he is now entitled to the protection of the American Government, and he asks it on the Case above set forth.

He was sick with small pox & other disorders at Cienfuegos, and he believes that his present situation deprived of necessary articles will bring on a relapse & that he must die if he remains where he is.

I respectfully ask that the American Consul be requested to see him and his assumed name of "Enrique Santa Cruz Lopez" - hear his statement - and assist for his release.

Marks of Identification are - aged years
Height about six feet - spare build - front teeth defective & plugged - one arm (I think the left) stiff in the elbow - eyes brown - hair brown - hands & feet small. He is a Citizen of the U.S America from Clarke Co. Virginia

We have tried the article in six cases and find that we can make no report of its effects on account of the limited amount at our disposal. We would much like a further supply, as large as possible, as we find that the cases under treatment warrant

Further trial. If there is no more of the article at the disposal of the Department, we would beg that this application be placed on file & a supply sent when possible.

Dear Sir;

In reply to your letter of June 15th in regard to the medicament called "Cundurajo" sent by the State Department to this Institution for examination, I have the honor to inform you that, not having the means ^{itself} of making the desired examination, owing to the destruction by fire in 1865 of the Smithsonian Laboratory, the

Institution submitted a portion
of the specimens of the plant
to the Surgeon General's Office,
to the Bureau of Agriculture
and to an eminent physi-
cian and Chemist in Phil-
adelphia, with the request
that an analysis of the
substance be made and
a report of the results for-
warded to this Institution.

In acknowledging the receipt
of the specimen at the Surgeon

Generals Office, the chief of that department informed us that an investigation of the substance was already being had with pieces of the plant furnished timely by the State Department. The Chemist of the Bureau of Agriculture reported that there was not a sufficient quantity of the "Cundurango" to make such an analysis as was desired. The party in the city of Philadelphia, to whom the plant was also

sent has, as yet, made
no report in connection
therewith. We shall, how-
ever, write to him at once
and ascertain what pro-
gress he is making with
the investigation.

Dear Sir.

As to the medicinal effects of Cremdurango, a sample of which was sent to the Massachusetts General Hospital for trial, the Officers of the Institution respectfully report that they are as yet unprepared to express an opinion, for the reason that the supply of the article was small and the time for experimentation short. It has been administered in six cases, four of them being still under treatment, but none as yet presenting any symptoms authorising an expression of opinion as to the effects of the drug. The Hospital has already written the Department of State asking for a further supply of Cremdurango, which, if received, it will give a fair trial.


