

BY THE GULF CABLE.

Serious Riots in Havana—Four Persons Killed and many Wounded—The Volunteers Called Out—Disturbances in Regla—Proclamation by Gen. Dulce, &c.

HAVANA, Jan. 21.—During the performance of minstrels at the Villa Nueva Theatre last evening there were seditionary cries of *Viva Cepeda!* and many of the audience commenced singing the revolutionary hymn. A formidable riot ensued, and Spanish armed volunteers and police fired upon the people, and the latter returned the fire. Four persons were killed and many were wounded on both sides. The affair has created the most intense excitement. Sensible men of both parties regret the occurrence of this outbreak.

No business was done to-day, owing to the troubles of last night, but the excitement is now quieting, and no further disturbances are apprehended.

The Diario says that a riot was attempted last night in the town of Regla, opposite Havana.—The volunteers were called out, and since then quiet has prevailed. At about the same time shots from small guns were fired against Fort Cabanas and Fort Numero Cuatro. The firing was kept up until one o'clock in the morning, but when the volunteers advanced they found no enemy.

A disturbance took place to-day in the city.—Shots were interchanged between the rioters and the volunteers, after which tranquility was restored.

Captain General Dulce has issued a proclamation, in which he says that, while justice will be rendered to all, severe punishment will be inflicted upon all disturbers of order.

The Banco del Comercio has resumed operations, but, under an arrangement with its creditors, full payment is postponed.

The Gaceta to-day publishes the provisions of the new electoral law for Cuba and Porto Rico. Cuba will send eighteen and Porto Rico eleven members to the Spanish Cortes.

THE SAN DOMINGO REVOLUTION.

HAVANA, January 21.—Advices from San Domingo say the official Gaceta states that the revolutionists under Ogando had been defeated. Private advices, on the contrary, say that the revolutionists have captured the villages of Nelba and Parabona, and are advancing on Agua.—A number of banished Dominicans had left Curacao, and landed on the southwestern coast. The Dominican government was forwarding troops to support President Baez, who was in the field against the revolutionists. General Luperon is reported to have landed on the northern coast. The entire coast was in an unsettled condition.

Mr. Harimont, a London banker, had arrived at the capital with the object of concluding a loan of two millions of dollars to President Baez. The latter grants, as a guaranty of the payment of the loan, all the copper mines and coal mines at Samana and the guano on the island of Alta Vela. The contract was expected to be signed this week, whereupon English vessels of war would immediately proceed to Samana and Alta Vela.

ASSASSINATIONS IN HAVANA, ETC.

HAVANA, Jan. 21.—Several soldiers belonging to the volunteer and regular forces were assassinated to-day. These transactions, together with the unsettled state of affairs in the island, cause much anxiety among the people.

Spaniards everywhere speak confidently of the early ending of the revolution.
