THE CUBAN REBELS. The Havana correspondent of the New York Tribune, gives the following account of the leaders of the insurrection:

Let the loyalists speak as they will, it is not certain yet that the insurgents are a vulgar class of people. You know that Cespedes, Aguillera, Marmol, Figueredo, Arango, Santa Lucia, and others of the chief leaders of the insurrection, were men of property, most of whom manumitted their slaves. In the recent western outbreaks, the prime movers have not been by profession either vagabonds or stealers of horses. In the district of Cienfueges, their names are Arredondo, a scrivener; Villegas, a manufacturer; Barrios, ex-Consul of the United States; Iunco and Escoban, lawyers; and Fortun, a railroad director. In Trinidad Martinez, a haciendado and Otto Schmidt, a merchant, have commands among the insurgents. Juan Ruiz, late Lieutenant Alcade, has also joined them. Menocal, who headed the Jaquez rising, was a man of property. In Sanctus-Spiritus the rebel leader Zimenes is a haciendado or planter. The same story can be repeated of 20 other districts of the island.
