

The London Times, in an editorial and by correspondent from Madrid, enters largely into the questions of Spanish relations with the United States and the revolution in Cuba. The annual Lancaster race meeting took place yesterday. Lord Byron's steward denies the truth of Mrs. Stowe's article. A monster demonstration of persons favorable to Fenian amnesty will be held in London on Monday next. There is great anxiety manifested in Paris over the discussion of the successor to the throne in the event of the death of Napoleon. Prince Napoleon is in Brussels. The Paris Journal Des Débats thinks that the resolutions of the recent American meeting conveying thanks to Prince Napoleon was carrying eulogy too far. A fleet of iron-clads will be sent from Spain to Cuba in November in case the United States recognize the Cubans as belligerents. The Humboldt centennial was celebrated in Berlin yesterday with great enthusiasm. At a festival at Konigsburg during the visit of the King, a bridge gave way, precipitating a large number of people into the river. Twenty-four bodies have been recovered. The political status of the Jews is receiving imperial consideration in Austria.

The centennial anniversary of the birth of Humboldt was celebrated in this city yesterday. The Boston Society of Natural History held a meeting in Music Hall, where an address was delivered by Professor Agassiz. A festival was given by the city authorities in Horticultural Hall, at which addresses were made by Ralph Waldo Emerson, the Rev. Dr. Hedge, and others; and poems by Oliver Wendell Holmes and Julia Ward Howe were read. The German citizens celebrated the occasion with music and an address by Mr. Karl Heinzen in Music Hall.

A party of thirty men, supposed to be on their way to join a filibustering expedition to Cuba, sailed from New Bedford on Monday night, but were pursued by a steamer and captured yesterday morning, and are now in custody in New Bedford.

An annexation meeting was held in Quebec on Sunday last. The leading spirit was O'Farrell, the counsel for Whalen, who was executed at Ottawa for the murder of Hon. Thomas D'Arcy McGee. A set of resolutions were adopted favoring union with the United States.

Yesterday afternoon, the committee of the Common Council of Boston called on the Harvard men, who arrived by the City of Antwerp, and tendered them the hospitalities of the city. They leave New York in company for this city at 5 P. M. today.

Among the gentlemen to participate in the ceremonies of breaking ground for the San Diego and Gila Railroad, California, are Hon. W. H. Seward, Generals Rosecrans and Sedgwick and Congressman Axtell.

Proceedings on writ of habeas corpus in the New York Supreme Court, yesterday, developed the fact that the robbers of the express car on the New York Central Railroad, on the 11th of August, obtained \$800,000.

Contributions for the relief of the Avondale sufferers are being forwarded very liberally. The Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Coal Company have given twenty thousand dollars and Adams Express Company a thousand.

In the school committee, last evening, Dr. John H. Woodbury was elected a member of the board in place of Dr. E. D. G. Palmer of Ward 4, deceased.

The Hornet, recently detained and searched at Halifax, put to sea on Monday night under circumstances that gave color to the supposition that she is intended for Cuba.

A match game of billiards for the championship and one thousand dollars is in progress in New York between Deery and Foster. Deery was ahead at last accounts.

Track-laying has commenced on the Denver Pacific Railroad from Cheyenne. The work is expected to proceed at the rate of two miles per day.

The steamship Cleopatra, from Vera Cruz and Havana, is long overdue, and fears are entertained for her safety. Nothing new has happened in connection with the Cuban revolution.

Prince Arthur will reach Quebec today. During his stay in that city he will be the guest of Sir Narcisse F. Billeau, Lieutenant-Governor of the province.

The whaling barque Thomas Winslow of New Bedford was foundered at sea during a hurricane on September 3.

The competing lines to the West are making strong efforts to obtain possession of the Boston, Hartford and Erie Railroad.

A monument of Alexander von Humbolt was unveiled in Central Park, New York, yesterday.

The Humboldt centennial was very generally celebrated.
