Singular Proclamation from Dulce's Commissioner to the Insurgents—Aid Tendered the Government by the Clergy, &c., &c.

NEW YORK, March 7. The following is a special dispatch to the Herald:

HAVANA, March 6. A proclamation dated at Nassau, N. P., and signed by Jose De Armas, Gen. Dulce's Commissioner to the Insurgents, has recently appeared. It is full of bitter invective against the Spanish Government and against Dulce personally, placing that gentleman in the position of accusing himself of the most contemptible actions.

Roderigues Corra, a companion of Commissioner Armas, publishes a card to-day in the *Diario*, wherein he expresses a belief that the card is a forgery, and saying that if it were genuine the statements of Armas are false and his conduct infamous.

The clergy have offered the Government one-sixth of their income to defray the expense of the war against the insurgents.

Gen. Dulce is recruiting a regiment of volunteers for active service.

Two hundred pounds of gunpowder have been found secreted in the house of a Mrs. Terry, in this city.

Late Cienfuegos papers say there is plenty of blockade running into the interior of that place.

Information from Puerto Principe states that the insurgent General Quesada is ill with small pox.
