

The Cuban Revolution—Further Details of the Battle at Los Tunas—The City Sacked by the Patriots—700 Killed and Wounded on Each Side.—
New York, Sept. 16.—A Havana letter states that a battle was fought at Los Tunas on the 16th of August, the patriots driving the Spanish into the Plaza, where one half of the Cuban army kept them engaged while the other half sacked the remainder of the place, taking away some three millions worth of goods, clothing and material. Spanish reinforcements from other towns being *en-route*, the patriots retired in good order with their plunder. The loss of the Cubans was about 700 killed and wounded. The Spanish loss was about the same.

A gentleman visiting Cuba, writes home from Cardenas under date of Sept. 1st, that since the recent insurgent victories at Los Tunas and elsewhere, the enthusiasm of the Cubans knows no bounds, and they are flocking to the liberating army by hundreds. The Spanish party admit that the revolution will succeed, their forces being nearly destroyed in the late battles. He also testifies to the revolting outrages committed by the Spanish volunteers on inoffensive Cubans, and says the people are dying by hundreds of disease superinduced by want.
