

## The Cuban Revolution.

HAVANA, Feb 11 Telegraphic communication between Havana and towns La Granda and Villa Clara, which had been destroyed by the revolutionists, has been restored. It is reported that the leaders of the revolution in the sugar districts of Cienfuegos, Villa Clara and Trinidad are Adolfo Canade and his brother Frederick. The former was recently the American Vice Consul at Cienfuegos, and was removed at the request of Capt General Lescuddi. He was Colonel of a Philadelphia regiment of volunteers during the civil war in America. The latter was, until the last week, American Consul at Trinidad de Cuba, and had just resigned.

HAVANA, Feb 11—Exodus. Arrests continue to be frequently made by the military and police of suspected parties in the city and throughout the island. Among the prisoners are many well known planters, merchants and lawyers. The English Consul at Cardenas is also among those arrested.

The Presso says that at present Herrier, Flechits and Camara are the only rebel leaders in the Central Department. None of the other Chiefs with them have appeared. The number of the rebel forces at Camarao is supposed to be three thousand.

The meeting of the merchants at the Palace, last night, to raise funds for the Government had no decisive result. A mixed committee of merchants and planters was appointed with instructions to report a feasible plan for supplying the needs of the Government, quickly and securely, without imposing any additional burdens upon the middle or poorer classes.
