

CUBAN RECOGNITION.

The Tribune has a report from Washington that the administration has now under earnest consideration the propriety of changing its course with regard to Cuba, and speedily recognizing the belligerent rights of the insurgents. This course is impelled by the evident feeling of the people of the country, and the temper of the majority in Congress. The report further states that Secretary Fish and Senator Sumner have expressed within three days such views as would indicate a changing policy toward the Cubans and a higher confidence in their future.

CUBAN NEWS.

A Havana letter of the 18th says General Carbo went up this week to take command of the Cinco Villas country, relieving General Lesca, who left for Spain on the 15th instant under an order of arrest resulting from the burning of Taquoyabon. His successor has been equally unfortunate so far, having been routed by General Cavada, and at this moment being besieged in Espiritu Santo. The Spaniards at Rioquin have met with a reverse, seventy of them having been captured on a late foraging excursion. Gen. Marmot is laying siege to Las Tunas. Report has it he intends to remain there and annoy the garrison and capture convoys coming from Manzanillo.

From Puerto Marengo intelligence comes that an expedition of 300 men had landed. Six thousand guns were brought along, besides 200 kegs of powder. Between the 3d and 18th of December, the property of 280 Cubans had been confiscated.

THE RAMSEY-FISK CASE.

Judge Balcom to-day delivered judgment at Binghampton on the Ramsey-Fisk case, deciding in favor of Fisk, on the ground that the plaintiffs failed to sustain their complaint, and that stockholders who wilfully absented themselves from the meetings at which certain Directors were elected, had no right afterwards to secure redress through the Courts for alleged mismanagement.

THE SPANISH GUNBOATS.

The Spanish gunboats and war steamer Isabella Catolica are still lying at quarantine. Their departure is hourly expected.
