The Southern people are outspoken for intervention in Cuba. In Savannah, the Republican says, the feeling in favor of the Cubans "is deep-seated and sincere, and extends from the driver of a dray to the merchant in his counting room." The four years of campaiguing through which nearly every able bodied man in the South has passed has naturally given them a desire for excitement, which would be precisely suited by a West Indian campaign. We suppose, however, that the Government officials are aware of this, and will check any movements in a filibustering direction.
