

## CUBA.

**The Cuban Revolution—Movements of the Troops—A Spanish Ambassador En Route to the United States—Rumors of a Serious Engagement—The Siege of Trinidad Raised—The Small-Pox Raging at Consuacion del Sar—Important Proclamation—Its Authenticity Denied.**

HAVANA, March 6.—The *Vois de Cuba* to-day publishes an account of the assassination of the sleeping crew of a coaster in the Sagua Chica river by the insurgents.

Still another schooner had landed a body of insurgents in the vicinity of Sagua. The citizens sunk the vessel to prevent their escape, and now the Government troops are marching against the parties who were landed.

Señor Roberts, the Spanish ambassador to Washington sailed from this port to-day in the regular mail steamer for New York.

The United States war steamer Gettysburg arrived yesterday, and soon afterward sailed again. She will visit the different parts of the island.

There are rumors of a serious engagement near Santa Spiritu, but no particulars at present.

Nobody has offered to carry the political prisoners to Fernando Po. It is reported that the Government has ordered the war steamer Cadiz to transport them.

The ladies of this city are collecting and subscribing large amounts of money to aid the volunteers.

The small pox is raging at Consuacion del Sar.

Advices from Trinidad to last Tuesday report that the siege had been raised. Three columns were in constant pursuit of the insurgent bands.

Advices from Santiago de Cuba to Saturday last state that every Spaniard in the town of Mayari has been killed. A column of eight hundred Government troops, all armed, had gone there.

A proclamation, dated Nassau, N. P., and signed by Jose De Armas, General Dulce's commissioner to the insurgents, has recently appeared. The document is full of bitter invectives against the Spanish Government, and against Dulce personally, placing that gentleman in an unenviable position, accusing him of the most contemptible actions. Rodriques Correa, the companion of Commissioner De Armas, publishes a card to-day, in the *Diario*, wherein he expresses the belief that the proclamation is a forgery, and says that if it were a genuine statement, Armas is false, and his conduct infamous.

The clergy have offered the Government one sixth of their incomes to defray the expenses of the war against the insurgents. General Dulce is recruiting another battalion of volunteers for active service. Two hundred pounds of powder have been found secreted in a house in this city. Late Cienfuegos papers state that there is plenty of blockade running into the interior from that place. Information from Puerto Principe states that the insurgent General Quesado had died with the smallpox.

NEW YORK, March 7.—A Madrid letter indicates that Caballero De Roda is coming to Cuba as general, under Captain General Dulce.
