

## FROM CUBA.

HAVANA, June 23, via Key West.—Gen. Baceta has arrived in Havana. He was hooted at in Santiago, and on his arrival at Cienfuegos was only saved from violence from the volunteers by the intercession of Gov. Heis. He is now concealed in this city, and will be compelled to escape by stealth.

Mobilized volunteers, garrisoning Matanzas, recently executed Robinson, aged 19, a son of a British resident, for carrying rebel correspondence.

Heavy skirmishes have taken place in Cinco Villas District, and it is reported that 150 Cubans and 100 Spaniards were killed.

It is known that large sums of money are forwarded to the United States for the purchasing of war material, and to aid the Cuban Juntas in fitting out expeditions.

HAVANA, June 24.—Gen. Baceta, falsely reported to have been killed by his troops, has gone to New Orleans.

Cholera has broken out in Guantnamo and vicinity. Several cases reported in Santiago. The disease is raging in the interior.

About the last of May the schooner Grapeshot landed forty men and a portion of her cargo on the Cuban coast. While boats were landing the men, some passengers on board attempted to run. The vessel ashore, when a fight ensued with crew and officers, in which capt. of Grapeshot received a bullet in his leg. Grapeshot finally got rid of the whole party, and without landing all her stores proceeded to Turk's Island, where she received clearance and arrived on the 4th, at Falmouth, Jamaica. There were 155 packages of arms and ammunition remaining on board, and were seized by the customs officers and the captain abandoned the vessel. The seizure was subsequently declared illegal, and the captain has sued the Collector of the Port and others for damages.

Several of the filibusters who landed at Batiqueri were executed at Santiago.

HAVANA, June 25.—The volunteer forces have, of their own free will, given up the duty of garrisoning Moro Castle and Fortress Cabanas, and will be relieved tomorrow by the naval forces. They have taken this action to convince the home government that they had no idea of disobeying its orders or opposing the new Captain General.

HAVANA, June 26.—There was heavy fighting again at Aux Cayes. Salnave was defeated with heavy loss.

It is reported that Supereon has landed at Puerto Plata, San Domingo, and demanded its surrender.

The port of Maracaibo, in Venezuela, has been closed.

HAVANA, June 26.—Marines are now guarding forts Moro and Cabanas; the volunteers, disavowing any intention to resist DeRhodes, having retired.

Eight hundred Spaniards were defeated and lost a convoy at Los Tunas. The Spaniards at Cinco Villas and Los Tunas are calling for reinforcements. General Puello says 5000 troops are required at Cinco Villas District.
