

From Cuba.

HAVANA, February 13.—The Americans at Cienfuegos have applied for a war vessel to protect them. It is impossible to send one now.

Havana is practically in a state of siege.

Admiral Hoff has consented to take American citizens to Key West.

The engineer employed in the San Antonio District reports that the Insurgents have appeared there. Plantation hands have fled, and work on the estates has ceased.

Plantation engineers from Neuvas, Abaya District, and other Districts, are coming here, fearing impressment.

A Trinidad letter of the 13th says the Cubans have raised the standard of rebellion everywhere, cut the telegraph and stopped the mails.

A Neuvas letter of the 11th reports that banditti are pillaging the estates of that District. A detachment of troops marched from Neuvas to Nuevel Bugo and burned the town, losing twenty men killed, wounded and missing in the expedition.

Many Spaniards are in the Insurgent ranks.

Famine threatens Puerto Principe.

LATER.—Transports have arrived with reinforcements from Spain.

Political arrests are daily increasing. Several officials suspected of revolutionary proclivities have been imprisoned.

Engagements are reported near Cienfuegos.

The Trinidad Esperato Santa Diarco states that the Insurgents are near Soquela Grande, surrounded, and will be compelled to surrender.
