

CUBAN.**Arrival and Proclamation of
the New Captain
General.****Fillibusters Captured and
Executed.****Ravages of the Cholera.**

HAVANA, June 28.

Gen. DeRoda arrived in the Harbor this morning. He brings with him a force of 900 regular troops. He landed at 11 o'clock, and was quietly received with only the customary ceremonies. As soon as he was installed in the palace he issued a proclamation. He says the platform of his line of conduct is embraced in three words: Spain justice and morality. He thanks the volunteers for the service they have rendered in the cause of order, justice and public rights, and tells them they ought to feel proud of their past action. He closes with an allocution to the army and navy.

The insurgents, 1,000 strong, attacked an encampment containing the garrison of Sabina, near Puerto Principe, on the inst., and captured the entire force of 80 men. The rebels destroyed the encampment and left four Spanish soldiers dead.

Advices from Santiago say a number of Fillibusters who landed from the Schooner Grapo Shot, and subsequently fell into the hands of the troops, had been executed. The leader was Chas. Deckman, of Aurora, Indiana and Albert Wyeth, of New York. The general headquarters of the Insurgents is established on the Elcercado plantation, and it is reported that the Cuban Generals Buesada, Valdez, Castello and Benetienta have met there and united their forces.

The cholera continues in the towns in the interior, and report say that a majority of the men who landed from the Paul and from other vessels, have either been killed by the troops or died from disease.

NEW YORK.**The Government Officers Over-
reached by the Cubans.****General Dix on the Presidential

NEW YORK, June 29.

It is stated that the steamer Catharine Whiting, which was seized by government vessels, was used as a decoy, while the officers were watching her movements, and the several revenue cutters—the real expedition embarked on another steamer and safely departed.

Marshal Barlow reiterates his statements that no expedition has left this port within a week. The officers who seized the Catharine Whiting, say there were no Cubans on board.
