

## FROM CUBA.

HAVANA, Aug. 25.

Insurgents with their families, to the number of 1,600, have presented themselves before the Spanish authorities near Holguin and asked for forgiveness and protection. Twenty other insurgents have presented themselves before the Spanish authorities in the Cinco Villas district.

The Spanish bank has made an offer of \$45,000 to the Government for the support of volunteer regiments. This makes the fourth donation of a similar amount by the bank for the support of volunteers.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.

Letters from the Cuban revolutionary army, via Key West, to friends in this city, contain news up to the 10th. No engagement is reported since the one near Puerto Padre, on the 5th, an account of which has been published, in the district commanded by Gen. Jordon. All the available Spanish force is being thrown in this district, to reinforce Valmaseda, and an early engagement of importance may be expected between the forces of Jordon and Valmaseda. Gen. Jordon asserts his readiness and desire for the contest, and is confident of success. It is stated that the defeat of Valmaseda would virtually end the war, as it would be impossible for Spain ever to send troops enough to regain the positions which they would lose. Gen. Jordon is placing his men in position for the fight, which was almost daily expected.

In Gen. Quesada's command, except a few skirmishes between small parties, it is reported there have been no engagements. The Spanish troops occupy fortified positions in the towns, and have suffered so severely from disease and other causes that the commanders are unable to do more than maintain their positions.
