Destruction of Sugar Plantations-Two Hundred and Eighty Insurgents Killed-Cholera and Smallpox at Santingo-An Appeal to Venezuela from the Insurgents.

HAVANA, Nov. 18.—Mr. Cowper, the English Consul at Trinidad, is charged with connivance with the Captain of the brig Echo in committing an act of barratry in selling the brig's cargo without notifying her consignee. The action causes much comment among the merchants, and logal steps have been taken to pro-

cure justico.

The Second Battalien of Volunteers have gone to the Vueita Abajo region. The insurgents in the neighborhood of Santiago have burned the plantations of Corestina, Resolucion, Santa Maria and Doloritas. The Sabanilla plantation has been burned by insurgents from near Frinidad. Ten plantations in the vicinity of Cienfuegos have been burned since the 1st of November, including the Harmiguera plantation, belonging to POUVERT, of New-York. The civil Governor of Santiago issued a proclamation on the 12th inst., announcing the killing of 280 Insurgents, and offering clemency to those will immediately surrender to Spanish authorities, but threatening to chastise all revolutionists captured. Captain-General DE RODAS has reduced the term of confinement of the prisoners at Cinco Villas one-fifth. has also pardoned and liberated over two hundred prisoners, many of whom were committed for political offences. It is understood in Hayana that a commission from the insurgent arrived Govornment has in Caracas purpose of inducing the Venezuelan recognize the insurgents Covernment to allow them as belligerents. and to raiso recruits for their army in Venezuela. The misery in Santiago, caused by cholera and smallpox, is increasing. General VALMASEDA has ordered that his salary be divided among the poor of Santiago.

A commission has been appointed to revise the duties on merchandise. The steamers Rapidan, for New-York, and Washington, for St. Nazaire, sailed to-day. The steamer Yuzoo sails to-

morrow for Philadelphia.
