

The News from Cuba.

General Dulce is pursuing a wise course in the installation of the new measures and policy of government in Cuba. As will be seen by our telegraphic advices, he has put a bridle on the military commission system and given freedom to speech and the pen. It is stated that neither the Cuban leaders nor the old organs of Spanish opinion, the *Diario de la Marina* and the *Prensa*, as yet accept his policy. This fact is one of the best proofs of its justice and a promise of its ultimate success. Had he sought the approbation of either wing of extremists he would have insured failure. The old Bourbons of the Havana press will never learn anything or forget anything, and it is well that they be superseded by new journals. As for the Cuban leaders, they will soon learn wisdom. The next will be a proclamation calling for the election of twenty-two deputies to the Cortes, as provided for by the new plan of government in Spain.
