. ĆUBA. Capture of a Schooner With Insurgent Cu-

bans on Board-Reports from Spanish Sources-Miscellaneous Items. HAVANA, Jan. 28, 1869. The Spanish man-of-war Venandito, after a sharp

chase, captured, near Romano Key, an English schooner halling from Nassau. A party of twentytwo native Cubans were found on board of the vessel. They were on their way to join the insurgents in this island. It is reported that during the

chase the men on the schooner, seeing that capture was inevitable, threw overboard a quantity of arms and ammunition.

Spanish accounts continue to represent that the insurgents in the Eastern Department in large numbers are presenting themselves to the authorities

and claiming the benefits of the amnesty proclamation. The wrecking schooner Arricta, seized on suspicion, has, after investigation, been released, there

being no evidence that she was engaged in carrying supplies to the rebels. The charges against Captain Adams, of the steamer Morro Castle, for carrying passengers without pass-

ports, have been dismissed. Since the recent disturbances in the city the theatres and all other places of public amusement have been closed.
