Ex-Captain General Lersundi and Admiral Chaon safled to-day for Spain. The steamer on which they embarked was accompanied some distance outside the Morro by tags and small boats containing the friends of the departing Captain General. His return to Spain is regretted by a targe number of our citizens.

This morning General Lersundi, previous to his embarkation, paid a visit to Admiral Hoff on board his flagship, the Contoccook. He was received with the usual ceremonies. This is the first instance known here of a Captain General going on board of a foreign man-of-war.

The inaugural proclamation of Captain General Dulce is awaited with much anxiety by Spaniards and Cubans, both parties being in the dark in regard to his future policy. The Cubans express the opinion that the revolutionists at Bayamo will refuse to listen to any propositions for a compromise, and the Spaniards are convinced that the troops now on the island, reinforced by those on the way hither from Spain, will speedily put an end to the revolution.
