

THE OFFICERS OF THE CUBAN CRUISER.

Their Arrival in New York and Transfer to the Custody of the United States Marshal.

The worthy citizens of Brooklyn were agitated yesterday by the appearance in their streets of a number of gentlemen wearing the uniform of Cuba. The strangers proved to be Nicholas H. Esling, David A. Telfair, Tomis French, Richard Gibson, Donald D. Monroe, Wm. D. Phillips and John Lynch, officers of the man-of-war Cuba, in durance vile at Wilmington. The offence with which they are charged is a violation of the Neutrality act of 1818, and, the alleged offence having been committed in this district, they will be tried here some time next month. The captain has not been held and is now in Washington. The prisoners were delivered to Mr. Dalton, United States Marshal of the Eastern district, by Mr. James M. Foote, United States Marshal of North Carolina. Shortly after being transferred they were brought before the Marshal and bound over in \$1,000 bail each to appear before the United States Circuit Court at its next session to answer. Marshal Foote also turned over to the custody of Marshal Dalton the following named witnesses in the case of the "Cuba:"—James Gordon, William Fowler, John Woodford and David McDonald.

The Last of Golconda's Expedition.

Captain Harris, the late commander of the Cuban steamer Lillian, arrived in this city on Sunday from his recent confinement in Nassau. It is said that he called on the officers of the Junta yesterday. None of the Captain's friends and acquaintances in this city and elsewhere attribute any blame to him for the late failure of the expedition under Golconda or Cristo, and it is highly probable that he will take the command of one of the vessels said to be now at one of our ports—namely, Philadelphia, Boston, Baltimore or New York.

General Golconda was expected in town last night from the scene of his latest mishap.

A Martyr to Cuban Independence.

Nandrus Munn, who was injured by the premature discharge of a cannon in the City Hall Park on the anniversary of Cuban independence, died at his father's residence, 26 avenue D, where he had been removed from the City Hospital, yesterday evening of gangrenous fever. He was twenty-nine years of age, and leaves a wife and three children.
